

Minesweeper Squadron Puts In At Georgetown

A six-ship flotilla of minesweepers based at Halifax and presently on manoeuvres from Charlottetown, led by H.M.C.S. Resolute under command of Commander A.C. Campbell, C. D., R.C.N., sailed into Georgetown harbor yesterday evening where they remained at anchorage overnight. The ships constitute the First Canadian Minesweeping Squadron which is on a thirty-six hour training cruise in Island waters.

Aboard the flagship is Lieutenant Governor F. Walter Hyndman as guest of Commander Campbell. In addition to the Resolute, there is the "Thunder", under command of Lt. Cmdr. T. F. Owens, the "Quinte" under command of Lt. Cmdr. R. P. Mylrea, the "Chignecto" under command of Lt. Cmdr. C. T. Gillis, the "Chaleur" under command of Lt. Cmdr. R. Carle and the

"Fundy" under the command of Lt. Cmdr. N. S. Norton. The presence of the six naval ships in Georgetown harbor, recognized for years as one of the finest of the Atlantic coast, gave residents and visitors an idea of the size and the real potential of this fine harbor and the number of ships it could accommodate if necessary for either peace time or war time purposes.

The funeral of the late John J. Larkin of St. Peter's Bay was held Monday morning from his late residence to St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the pastor of the parish Rev. George MacDonald, who also conducted the services at the grave. Pallbearers were: Leonard McKenna, Hilary McInnis, Merlin McInnis, Arthur Flynn, Fred Curran and Carl Wood.

The late Mr. Larkin who was in his eighty-third year died at his home last Friday morning. A prominent farmer during most of his life time, in his younger days he had operated butter factories both at St. Peter's and Morell.

A veteran supporter of the Liberal Party, he was for many years a member of the local committee.

He is survived by three sons and one daughter: Herbert, who resides on the home farm; Eugene, a resident of Morell, Phil, a social worker employed in Combermere, Ontario; and Victoria, Mrs. Frank McPhee, Fredericton, N.B.

He was predeceased by his wife, the former Emma Phelan of Morell, who died just over one year ago, and two sons: Raymond, who died as a result of a lumbering accident near his Selkirk home four years ago; and Arthur, who was killed in action while serving with the Canadian Army during World War Two.

Red Cross Blood Clinics Slated For Week June 23

It was announced last evening by Mr. F.A.S. Jones, Provincial chairman of the Red Cross Blood Donor Committee, that plans are now almost complete for the next four days of Blood Donor Clinics to be held in the Province during the week of June 23rd.

Six of the eight clinics which are being set up to produce at least 1,200 donors, are being held in Prince County where 900 of the overall objectives are expected to register. Ellerslie, O'Leary, Tignish, Alberton, Kinkora and Kensington are the centres in which these clinics are being held in Prince County. On the fourth

day the clinics will be at Mount Stewart in the afternoon and at Morell in the evening.

At the first series of clinics for 1958—held in Charlottetown, Summerside and at the R.C.A.F. Station the end of May—there were 1,852 donors registered on the year's objective of 5,000.

"This leaves a balance of 4,000 donors to be secured at the June, August and December clinics," said Mr. Jones, who also remarked that Prince Edward Islanders have established attendance records at Blood Donor Clinics during the past couple of years, and are leading Canada in donor response on a percentage basis.

Two American Youth Tours To Visit Here This Summer

MONCTON. — George Stiven of Moncton, general passenger agent for Canadian National Railways in the Atlantic Region, disclosed Thursday that 20 members of an American youth organization will bicycle through sections of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island this summer.

Sponsored by American Youth Hostels Inc. of New York, two tours with 10 youths in each will combine cycling with CNR travel on land and sea in separate vacation trips to the Mar-

times. Each party will spend about six weeks in Nova Scotia and on the Island.

Mr. Stiven said the first group is scheduled to leave New York June 27, with departure date on the second following July 4. Each party of 10 will be in charge of a leader appointed by the New York organization.

Via the Canadian National's M.V. "Bluenose", the leading unit will arrive in Yarmouth, N.S., June 30. There they'll take to their cycles for the next two weeks, wheeling to Halifax.

They are scheduled to leave Halifax July 13 by CNR for Truro, New Glasgow and Antigonish.

On July 15, the visitors will travel by CNR from New Glasgow to Antigonish, where they'll climb back on their cycles for 12 days of pedalling through scenic Cape Breton. They will entrain again at Sydney July 27 for New Glasgow, Bound for P.E.I., where on Aug. 1 another Canadian National train will take them back to the mainland via the Ferry, M.V. "Abegweit", en route to Moncton and Montreal. From Montreal they are scheduled to return to New York via CNR, arriving Aug. 8.

With a similar route mapped out, the second group will leave New York July 4 and return Aug. 15 en route to Montreal both sections will spend three days in Quebec City.

While the youth hostlers are travelling from point to point by train their cycles will be checked to accompany them.
