Boston Sweeps Double-Bill Gets Back Into Contention

Boston's persistent Red Sox allowed back into the rolling American League pennant race Saturday by sweeping Washington 10-2 and 7-2 while Cleveland, New York and Chicago—the top three in the standings—managed no better than a split in their doubleheaders with the second division.

Baltimore edged the Yanks when Gil McDougald was charged with interference and runner Chuck Diering was waved home from third in the 11th inning. Earlier umpire John Rice decided outfielder Hank Bauer had trapped a low liner and Baltimore scored twice on the play. Jim Wilson went all the way for his ninth victory.

In the afternoon, the Orioles made five errors. Tommy Byrne, shelled in the first inning of the opener as each club scored three runs, came back in relief in the fifth inning of the nightcap and to the victory, his 14th.

CHICAGO WINS AT LAST
The White Sox tumbled to their fourth straight defeat in the opener as Ray Boone drove in three runs with a double and home run in the Tigers. Southbay Billy Hoeltz failed to last a four-run Detroit first inning.

Bob Keegan and Billy Pierce teamed to whitewash the Tigers in the nightcap of the twin bill, which drew 38,309 at Detroit. Keegan went the first 5 2/3 innings for the decision. Pierce saved it for him. The Sox had only four hits off Frank Lary.

In the National, Brooklyn reduced its magic number to three.

RCAF Flyers Take Lead In Island Softball Finals

Norm Haney struck out 18 batters and allowed only 3 hits as the RCAF Flyers defeated the Charlottetown Sunshine Dairy at the Summerside airport softball diamond last evening by the score of 6-3 in the first game of a best of five series for the softball championship of Prince Edward Island. All three Charlottetown runs were earned and all were scored in the third inning as a result of two walks and a home run to deep right field by Hartinger.
