Troupe Proves 'Show Biz' Is A Universal Language

It sounds improbable all right, but you really didn't have to understand a word of French to reap the full pleasure of Les Jeunes Comediens who appeared yesterday afternoon and evening at Confederation Centre.

The nature of the humor it took six very talented young performers to project the full meaning of the skits and maintain a continuous atmosphere of rib-tickling fun.

For the evening performance "Man and Beast" was added to "Lessons on Love" to round out a full two-hour program. The seven members of the troupe are: Jean-Luc Bastien, Nicole LeBlanc and Frederic Dewancher. The group had a sell-out audience for yesterday afternoon's performance and a large audience for the evening performance.

While to most in the audience the language was pretty much out of grasp there was no difficulty catching the humor or the point of the skits. This was due entirely to the skilled, animated presentation of this talented troupe from the National Theatre School in Montreal.

Story and humor are projected through delicate but masterful actions and voice inflections. For an English audience the message almost entirely is visually projected.

The seven members of Les Jeunes Comediens have developed this unique form of art to an extremely high degree. The acting is complemented first by the company's youthfulness and agility, and through skillful use of props, music, dance and good old slapstick, which is universally understood.

There were two performances yesterday. One in the afternoon for students of Kings and Queens counties and another in the evening for adults. The matinee drew a full house and there was a good crowd at the evening performance. The one thing common to both audiences was their complete acceptance and approval of the program.

For the students the program was shortened to include only "Lessons on Love" a series of skits by Moliere. They were variations on the theme—how men and women will always love yet hate, exalt yet deprecate themselves.

The brand of humor in the skits is obvious from the titles alone: how to seduce a beautiful young lady under the eyes of her jealous suitor; how to court two women at the same time; how little quarrels nourish love; how to protect the joyful intimacies of marriage from interfering strangers; and how a woman leads her husband around by the nose. Jury Finds Southport Youth Died From Accidental Shotgun Blast

Following approximately 18 minutes of deliberation, a coroner's jury last night returned the verdict that 15-year-old Gordon Alexander Gay of Southport came to his death at Keppoch, on the farm of William Wood on Nov. 26, as a result of a gunshot wound in the right side of the face below the right ear and that the gun was accidentally discharged while in the hands of David Keenan and for that reason attached no blame to David Keenan.

The jury was sworn in at the MacLean Funeral Home on Nov. 26 and viewed the remains at that time included George Reid, Charlottetown, foreman; Vincent Shea, Sherwood; James Lee, Sherwood; Preston Macdonald, Parkdale; John M. MacLaren, Sherwood; Findlay Fraser, Sherwood and Ralph Stewart, Charlottetown.
