

Supreme Court Hears Rape Case Re-Trial

SUMMERSIDE — The petty jury was selected and sworn in, and Crown Prosecutor George MacMahon called six witnesses in yesterday's opening of the Supreme Court re-trial of Cedric Frederick Bouchéon, of Minto, N.B., charged with the rape, June 23, 1963, of a 16-year-old O'Leary girl.

Mr. Justice R. B. Bell appointed J. Melville Campbell of Summerside counsel for the accused and following that Mr. MacMahon addressed the jury. He stated that he intended to call 11 witnesses but the testimony of one of them, Mrs. Janice MacKay of the RCMP crime laboratory at Sackville, N.B., would have to be read as Mrs. MacKay is in hospital.

He then called Joseph Coy Cannon of Summerside who described some of the events leading up to the alleged offence in the Rogers ranch area of Wilmot School District.

In addition Mr. MacMahon called Joseph Edward Arsenault, Victoria Walsh, formerly Victoria Gallant, Mary Amelia Cannon, Ruth Helen Gallant and Rose Gallant.

There will be six sessions in all given over the six-week period. The same material will be covered in all the classes during any given week.

Although the classes have been well attended this week, Crusade headquarters are hoping to see the number doubled in the coming week.
