J. R. White, president, said the figures are subject to review by the company's auditors. Audited figures would be published in the annual report in April.

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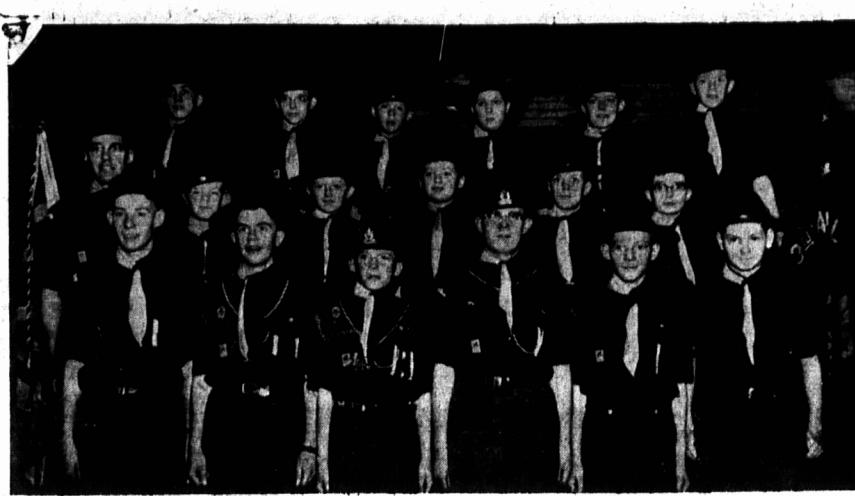

Rail Lines To Chop Time From Trans-Continent Run

MONTREAL (CP)—Canada's two big railways have announced they will chop healthy chunks of running time from their Montreal Toronto to Vancouver schedules. They credited diesel power for the extra speed.

In a spectacular move to lure passengers, Canadian Pacific Railway said Tuesday the time on the westward trip will be cut by 15 hours, and the eastward by 12 1/2 hours. It will be the biggest such reduction in Canada's rail history, a spokesman said.

Canadian National Railway also announced it will fully dieselize its transcontinental passenger train services and this will enable the line to "considerably reduce" its running time. No specific times were mentioned.

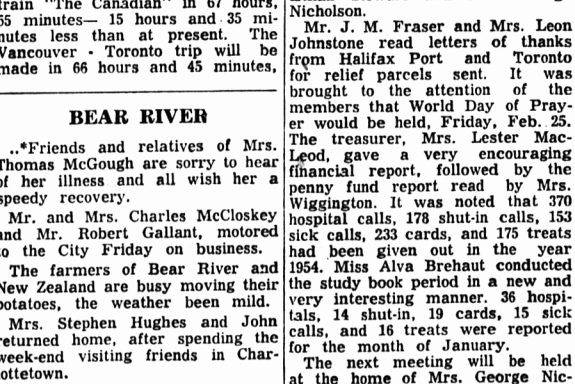

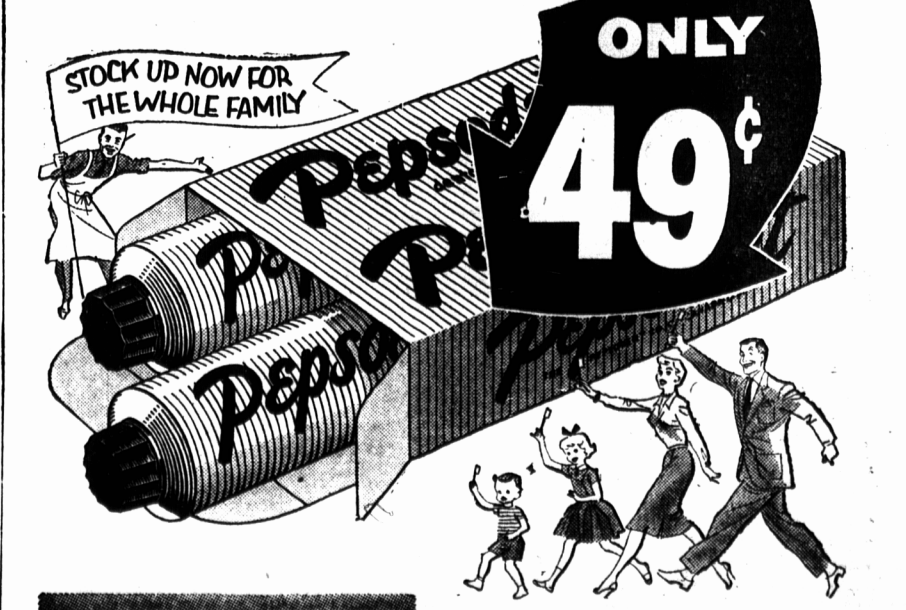
