Cross not knowing the manner of his gun was cocked pulled the trigger and instantly killed Hogan. Cross has surrendered to the police.

LOTS OF BEE.—A Liverpool paper gives the following list of live stock and fresh meats landed at that port by seven steamers from Canada and the United States during one week in September: 2,265 sheep, 2,247 calves, 20,567. Commenting upon these figures the Montreal Gazette says: The English people have a great capacity for beefing, but over 7,000 cattle and 20,000 carcasses of live stock landed at one port in Canada and the United States is a rather large order for the British public. When the market is flooded like this it is wonderful that prices are low.

HALEIGH DISPUTE.—The small schooner that was dismantled off Egg Island towed last Thursday by the steamer Fastnet, is in dispute between Pickford & Black's wharf. The crew of the schooner has been estimated at 400. There are 400 quintals of coal aboard. The captain of the schooner is named Cruise. He used to be in the steamer Bridgewater. Captain Oakes, of the steamer, is interested in the schooner. The Avon was riding at anchor off Egg Island a message was sent to Bridgewater for the steamer Bridgewater to bring the rescue and take the Avon in tow. Being the wait for the Bridgewater, Captain Oakes was in sight. Captain Oakes' vessel was coming on and he decided to signal the Fastnet. He stated that the agreement was that the steamer would receive \$200 to tow the Avon into the harbor. It is understood that Pickford & Black's offer for \$500. A law suit is looked for. The Fastnet's side of the story has not been told.—Halifax Herald.

A despatch from London says the bark Ralph B. Peake, Rendle master, from Liverpool to Charlottetown, has put into St. Michael's with a loss of sails and bulwarks and stanchion damaged.

ST. PATRICK'S HALL.—The demands made upon the St. Vincent de Paul Conference for fuel and provisions at the approach of winter are more than equal to the resources of the Society. The members have, therefore, arranged for a series of musical and literary entertainments to be given in St. Patrick's Hall during the autumn and winter months. The first of these entertainments will be given on tomorrow (Thursday) evening. The admission fee is only ten cents, so that all are afforded an opportunity of assisting in the noble work of helping the poor. It is to be hoped the hall will be crowded. Doors open at 7.30; entertainment commences at about a quarter to eight.

SMALL THEATRICAL COLONY.—Bay Fortune is bidding fair to become quite a Thespian camping ground. Mr. Charles Coghlan actor and dilettante and his charming wife and daughter (who by the way is quite a good artist in oil) have long been identified with that part of the Island. Mr. C. P. Flockton who recently bought Abel's Cape, has made many improvements there—with its broad verandas—which give the place quite an Indian look, and other additions, the old house is scarcely to be recognized. Mr. W. B. Boynton, who is the "Prithvi" to Mr. Flockton's "Damon," is still at the Cape, and now "Dame Remor" has it that a prominent English actor and his wife have bought land and intend to build a house on the river. The solitude and beauty of the country evidently have many charms for the disciples of the "Soc and Buskin."—Con.

A HARD CASE OF USURY.

The Montreal papers of last week gave some facts relating to a case of usury which it is feared is not an isolated one. About two years ago a poor coal heaver named Chapin, being sick and out of work, was obliged to negotiate a loan of \$100 from a money lender. The money lender, who is a family of small children from suffering. He applied to a lawyer named Deners, who agreed to give him the money at the villainous interest rate of eight per cent. per month. The poor man was unable to pay even the interest and after the lapse of time an action was brought for the recovery of the amount of the note and accumulated interest of two hundred dollars. This Chapin was condemned to pay. Not this, but during the proceedings the lender was called in one of the pleadings, "a professional usurer." This he considered an injustice, and sued for libel, recovering a verdict for twenty-five dollars with costs. The note, interest, libel judgment and costs amount to about five hundred dollars. In the meantime Chapin has been working with a writ at the suit of one of the city bankers, ordering him to retain all moneys in his possession belonging to Deners, and as a rule had been issued, ordering him to be arrested, and lodged in the common jail until he had paid the amount of the judgment obtained by Deners, the poor fellow, who was actually under arrest, was in a state of prostration. At last accounts a stay of proceedings had been granted by the court, and Chapin was released, but the end is not yet. There must be something radically wrong with the laws of Quebec when such things can be.
