There passed away peacefully at Charlottetown on August 27th, Mrs. Peter D. Hickey, nee Sarah Adeline (Evelyn) MacDonald in the sixty-fifth year.

She was born at Seven Mile Bay, January 19, 1890, her parents being John A. MacDonald and Margaret Anne Muttart. The late Mrs. Hickey was in poor health during the last ten years of her life. In 1947 her husband died, which placed on her an additional cross and added to her infirmity. She bore her crosses with perfect patience and resignation. She was mindful always of the better life beyond the tomb. In spite of ill health she managed the affairs of her home in an exemplary manner. By reason of her truly motherly qualities and Christian virtues she instilled into her family solid Christian principles.

The funeral was held on August 30, from her late residence to St. Mary's Church, Indian River, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Until just three weeks before his death, Mr. MacDonald had enjoyed excellent health and strength for one of his age. In the home and the neighborhood, the sincere, friendly interest, which he always took in the everyday activities of family and friends, will long be remembered and missed.

The funeral was held from his home on November 21 at 2 p.m. The service at the home and the grave was conducted by the Rev. D. A. Campbell of Montague, who took as his text Job 19:25-27. Hymns sung were: the twenty-third Psalm, "There's a Land That is Fairer Than Day," and "Safe In The Arms Of Jesus."

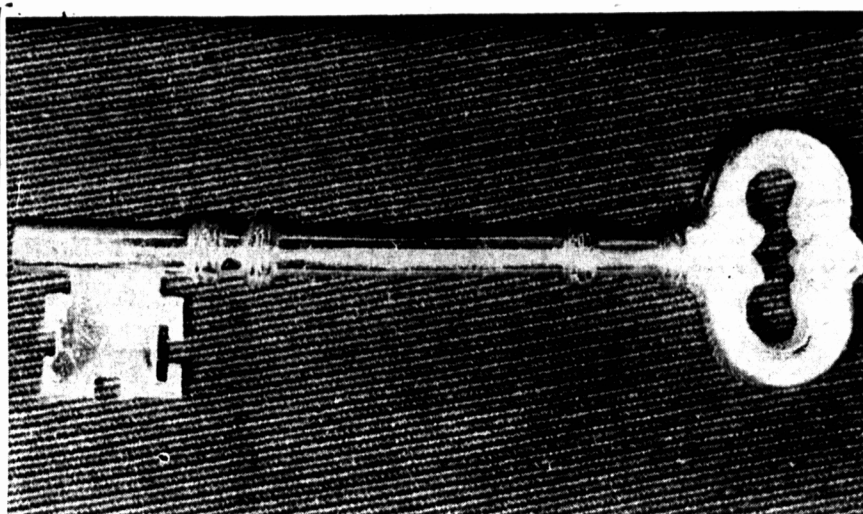
The President presented retiring officers with suitable gifts. The secretary was asked to send Christmas cards to the older residents of the district.
