**FIFTEENTH CENTURY WAGONS.**—The account books of All Souls College, Oxford, are in an excellent state of preservation, and from them we are able to get a correct idea of the wages paid about A. D., 1438. Carpenters and sawyers got about six pence a day; daubers, fivepence; stonemasons and laborers, fourpence halfpenny; carpenters and joiners, eightpence, a master-carpenter, three shillings and fourpence a week, enjoying also a tithe from each laborer employed under him, a custom still existing in many parts of India and which the engineers there are trying to abolish. A skilled mason received four shillings and eightpence a week, with bed and board, as he generally came from a distance. In those halcyon days a horse cost the modest sum of three pounds.

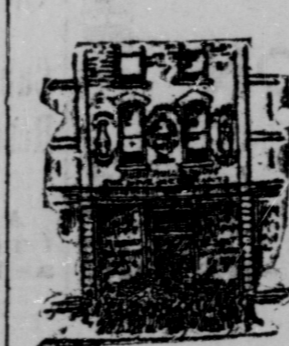
