

Student Union Meeting Report EDITED

The second meeting of the new S.U. Council was held Sun. Mar. 17. The first item was the forming of a constitutional committee to make changes in the constitution. Marilyn MacPherson, in charge of this committee was absent and it was set aside for next meeting. The executive report was given by Gordon Campbell. It was put before council that committee heads should serve till the end of spring semester. The yearbook editor should serve until the yearbook was completed. This was carried by council. Next year the executive would like to give each class a budget of \$100. and thereafter \$100 to the freshman class. Each class would be solely responsible for any losses. This was carried by council. In future there is to be a review of all pay scales of S.U. employees by either the executive or the personnel board. This

will probably come to a motion in the near future. Last year \$5000 was spent on telephone calls. In future all telephone calls will have to be approved by the executive. Joanne Ings reported on Senate, stating there was a committee formed including Gordon Campbell to choose a new Chancellor. March break will be March 1-9 next year. The problem of attendance being part of a student's mark was discussed however the conclusion was reached that little could be done due to the attitude and subjectivity of the marking system. Residence grievances were covered, including the washing machines in Bernadine Hall. It was concluded that as the machines aren't working that the ones in Marion should be used. Ted Crockett reported that the folding doors over the cafeteria could be replaced for \$100 during the summer rather than \$440 now by utilizing

the university maintenance department. During break two pipes broke in the Barn due to faulty thermostats. It was agreed that repairs be made to a limit of \$400. Other business was the raise in the yearbook fee to \$6 and the fact that some people would prefer not to have a yearbook at this price. It was brought up by Bill Chandler that it costs the same amount to publish 500 books as it does to publish 1400. At that point the subject was dropped. The graduation fee has been raised by \$5 next year to go to the senior class to pay expenses of senior week. It was proposed that an External-Vice President be appointed to obtain fair treatment for students of campus. This was referred to Mike Read for further study. The next meeting will be Sunday March 31 in Memorial Hall Lounge.



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
