Delegates Arrive Today For Kinsmen Annual

SUMMERSIDE—Between 600 and 700 delegates from many of their families—will begin arriving here today for the three-day annual Maritime Division No. 7 Kinsmen convention slated for Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The delegates will be representing all parts of the Maritimes and as far as Wabush, Labrador, convention chairman Jim Harris said recently.

The convention is being brought to a fitting climax with a governor's dinner and ball Saturday evening at the vocational school.

Mr. Harris stressed that this is being billed as a holiday convention and Kinsmen have been encouraged to bring along their families. A good number of these delegates are expected to arrive here for their holidays following the convention.

Another visiting official will be the secretary of the association, Murray Bowman, of Toronto.

Registration will commence Thursday noon, with business sessions on Thursday evening, and end Saturday night.

SPECIAL MARQUEE

All sessions will be held in a marquee erected in front of the Garden of the Gulf Motel in cooperation with the P.E.I. centennial committee.

Friday morning's meeting will be climaxed by an election for new governor of this district for 1964-65.

Social events will include an outdoor barbecue Thursday evening and a stag luncheon at the RCMP station officer's mess Friday noon.

Kinsmen, on that day, will have their luncheon at the Legion home here during which time they will conduct business sessions.

A mammoth parade is planned for a Friday afternoon through the town.

Magistrate Commends Police For Crackdown

Magistrate A. J. Haslam QC. commended the city police for cracking down on drinking in the public squares yesterday in City Police Court.

Police Chief Webster warned in court that there would be a heavy crackdown on all loafers and drunks.

The statements came after Barry Reginald Russell Carr of Charlottetown received a \$20 fine for disorderly conduct in one of the squares.

Two women and four men were charged with being drunk and incapable. One woman received a \$10 or five day fine and the other a \$20 or 30 day fine. Three of the men received the fine of \$20 or 20 days, the fourth 20 days with the commitment held.

Council Votes For Trailer Ct.

BORDEN—A special meeting of the Borden Town Council was held in the council room of the Borden Town Hall to discuss special business with Mayor Gilbert Bell presiding.

First item to be dealt with was the application for a trailer court which, after consideration, was granted the go-ahead. Continuation of clean-up work was discussed and as a result notices are being sent to offenders to the effect that they have seven days to do such work as was deemed necessary. If work is not completed before that time, court action will result.

Defered to the next meeting was the decision to buy a new fire truck. Prices for the truck were quoted and the matter came in for due discussion before the council decided to table it until the next session.

Renovations are to proceed immediately on the old Irving gas station which has been leased by the town for use as a fire station.

HALIFAX (CP)—The weather office says all three Maritime provinces reported temperature readings in the 80s on Tuesday with Fredericton and Charlottetown reporting the highest readings with 88 degrees. In Nova Scotia Greenwood's maximum of the 23rd of 84 set in 1937, Greenwood's records date back to 1942.

A low pressure area centered 150 miles north of North Bay, Ontario, late Tuesday evening was moving eastward. It is expected to continue to feed warm moist air to all regions today. It now appears likely that the shower and thunderstorm activity associated with this low will be restricted to New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. With considerable more cloud expected today, temperatures in localities will be cooler than those experienced on Tuesday.

view "alternative service" to practically all of the area served by CFCE-TV. The pattern of alternative service in other areas has been that the existing station has its audience cut in half, and national advertising revenues drop in proportion. This turn of events would place CFCE-TV in a ruinous position. That application for the use of Channel 8 was turned down by the BCC on objections from CFCE-TV, CKCW-TV Moncton, and the CBC.

"There is little doubt that the Halifax interests will renew their application for the use of Channel 8 to provide "alternative service" in this area. If the BCC grants the application it is our view that CFCE-TV will be put out of business. In this context that CFCE-TV held exploratory conversations with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation."

Mr. Large went on to say "It is not hard to appreciate the reaction of viewers who probably would like to have a different program on each channel from 2 to 13. Many authorities estimate that a television station must have a circulation of some 50,000 homes to achieve a "break-even" position. In Prince Edward Island there are about 20,000 homes with television sets, and CFCE-TV picks up an additional 10,000 homes in the adjacent areas of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to give a total circulation of approximately 30,000. This falls far short of the minimum required, and it can readily be seen that if it is further divided up by additional stations the existing difficulties are compounded beyond reason.

"Ottawa has just recently announced a new inquiry into broadcasting in this country, and the results of which probably will not be known for nearly a year. It is understood that the resource ministers conference will be one of the matters to be investigated. Under such circumstances, who knows, least of all CFCE-TV, what the future may hold?"

TO CONTINUE INVENTORY

The inventory report is being prepared by Dr. W. E. Haviland of Montreal, co-ordinator of a review team established to carry out the study. It will be continued through other renewable resource programs.


Dr. Haviland indicated in his appraisal that the economic land classification program is a pioneering effort in Manitoba, pointing in the general direction of future developments in land use planning in that province and elsewhere.

It would also draw attention to the regional concept of resource planning and co-ordination, the council said in a statement after the session.

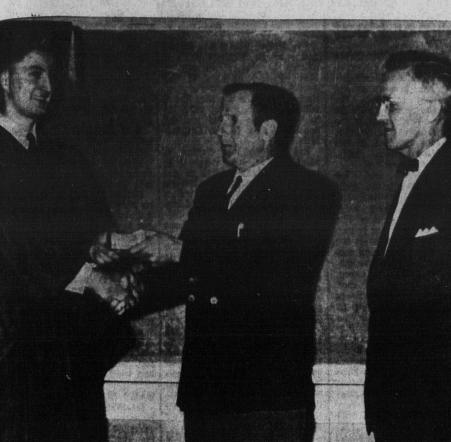
The council was interested in holding a resources conference in 1967, and the board of directors was instructed to study the feasibility, the statement said.
