

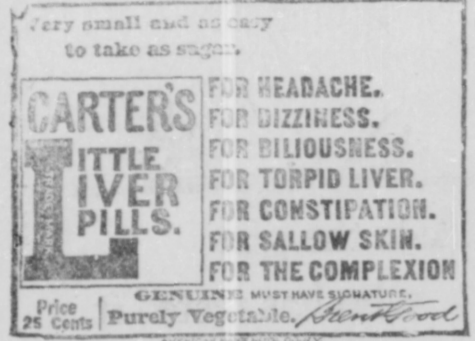

MILK AND CHEESE.

A Reply to "Patron" by Mr. J. C. Underhay.

DEAR SIR,—I fear the letter of your correspondent "Patron" in the last WEEKLY EXAMINER is more calculated to aggravate the evil he complains of than to abate it. I have noticed among cheesemakers generally a strong desire to compare favorably with other factories with regard to the average quantity of cheese made per 100 lbs. of milk. While this is laudable in itself, it may, and I have reason to believe it does, in some cases, tend towards a decrease in the apparent number of pounds of milk supplied to the factory rather than an increase in the amount of cheese produced. This would not injure any person provided the reduction fell on all alike. But it must be apparent to your readers that if the scales take a pound more to turn than they ought to that pound will come off the poor man's 20 or 30 lb. can as well as from the 150 lb. or 500 lb. can of his more prosperous neighbor.

In support of this theory, as opposed to that advanced by "Patron," I would refer your readers to the statement of business done by the cheese factories in this province published in the report of the P. E. Island Dairy Association, by which it will be seen that the correct average was obtained by those factories supplying the largest amount of milk per patron, and the highest by the factory supplying the smallest amount per patron; also that the St. Eleanor's factory, owned and operated by Mr. Sidney Richardson, the most experienced cheesemaker in the province, reached the lowest average but two, and his cheese has had a reputation unsurpassed for quality. Besides this I believe Mr. Richardson purchases the milk from the patrons which would offer an additional inducement for him to get all that was in the milk out of it; and it seems scarcely possible that a system of handling the milk should obtain in one factory by which half a pound or more of cheese could be made from a hundred pounds of milk more than what was obtained from the same quantity in another factory without notice or mention in the instructor's report.

As my only object in writing at present is to defend the cheesemakers, who have a pretty hard situation to fill satisfactorily, against undeserved censure and to promote the interest of co-operative dairying—I will have the discussion of this large amount of tax imposed on the factories and the benefit derived therefrom to enliven the approaching political campaign. Hoping that I have not already trespassed too far on your valuable space.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The London Economist has been looking into Sir Wilfrid Laurier's "British preference," and is surprised to find that after all the "blowing" the British preference has resulted in increasing United States sales to Canada by 64 1-2 per cent, British sales to Canada by only 12 1-2 per cent. But as the Mail and Empire aptly remarks there ought to be no reason for surprise. To the United States the government gave straight reductions in duties; but when Laurier came to deal with John Bull he made all the duties higher and then reduced them again, explaining that he did this because he loved the Union Jack so well.

—Mayor Van Wyck, of New York, has issued a proclamation drawing attention to the distress in Ottawa and Hull, calling for generous help from his fellow-citizens to relieve the afflicted cities, and naming a treasurer to receive contributions. Mayor Harrison, of Chicago, has opened a subscription list for the benefit of the sufferers. Mayor Maybury, of Detroit, has telegraphed to Ottawa asking if Detroit people can be of any assistance. Speaking editorially of the fire the New York Tribune says:—"This country can be sorely counted on for sympathy, and we hope for something more, for there must be a great need of assistance in the immediate work of feeding clothing, and sheltering the destitute." To the honor of the American people it is to be said that they have a heart and hand always open to help masses of their fellow-beings overtaken by any visitation. Not only Ottawa and Hull, but all Canada, will remember with gratitude the kindness at this time of our friends across the line.

—Since the beginning of the war the Schreiner family have received a good deal of advertising. While the mother and two other members of the family are undoubtedly most loyal British subjects, W. P. Schreiner, premier of Colony, must be marked at least "poubful," and Olive Schreiner and her husband Cronwright Schreiner are the most extreme Boers outside of Pretoria. Yet this same Cronwright Schreiner wrote in 1874, of the Afrikaner Bond as follows:

"The collective wisdom of the Bond is foolishness. It represents the section that is the least capable of progressive legislation. It has succeeded in preventing measures that were absolutely necessary to the welfare of the colony. Under the Bond regime the height of political corruption has been reached. In districts where the Bond is dominant there is no political freedom. Its policy towards the natives is unjust, inhuman and foolish. It wishes to entirely disfranchise and keep down the natives. Its policy is fraught with the greatest danger to the colony. The Bond sacrifices the welfare of the country to the supreme action of the Dutch inhabitants, disregarding the rights of others."
