## MacLean Places Effort In Atlantic Provinces

OTTAWA—Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean is concentrating his election efforts on the Atlantic Provinces. Between visits to Ottawa to take care of departmental business, Mr. MacLean is spending considerable time on speaking engagements in Newfoundland, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

On his visits to Ottawa he is sometimes acting Prime Minister in the absence of Mr. Diefenbaker, Mr. MacLean has filled in for Mr. Diefenbaker on several public occasions.

So far he is leaving the major part of the conservative party campaigning in his own riding of Queens to his party running mate, Heath Macquarrie. This enables Mr. MacLean to devote more time to his departmental duties and more time to speaking engagements in other Atlantic areas, particularly those which are closest allied with the fishing industry.

## 'Shine' Said Sold To Jail Prisoners

**TIGNISH** — "We seem to be fighting a losing battle against the moonshiners in Tignish," Police Constable Howard Folow stated yesterday. ## Hon. L. Balcer Is Here Today

## University Education Said Canada's Big Need

Two reports and a tea at Government House comprised the afternoon schedule for the delegates to the IODE conference yesterday.

The report of the Second War Memorial was presented by Mrs. R. C. Bennett, Hamilton, Ont., with municipal secretary. The report of the committee on the constitution was presented by Mrs. J. G. Spragg, conservative, Toronto.

Mrs. Bennett warned the annual meeting that Canada is "sadly lacking in university education." She said Canada must encourage higher education if it wants to help in the fight for world freedom.

She said Canada's survival as a free nation depended on the response of students to the "challenge of an all-out race for world supremacy."

She said only 15 to 20 per cent of students able to graduate from high schools do so, and said this was a "shocking waste" of Canadian human resources.

Although there was a great demand for university graduates to man the country's corporations, 91 per cent of graduates received only secondary school education.

"It is our job for our government to see that we correct the situation," she said.

Mrs. Bennett said the government of the United Kingdom had seen the problems and during the coming year all U.K. students who reached a certain academic standing would automatically receive government assistance to attend university.

She also said a large number of students who held IODE bursaries and scholarships were forced to drop from school during the past year because of failure or other reasons, and said this was a matter of "deep concern" to the order.

She announced winners of 25 IODE bursaries and nine second world war memorial post-graduate scholarships.

**BACKS IMMIGRATION**  
Immigration does not cause unemployment, but rather creates jobs, Mrs. R. Douglas Jennings stated in the morning in delivering the national immigration and citizenship report.

"As IODE conveners express in their reports, immigrants do not cause unemployment. On the contrary, immigration actually creates jobs, enhances the economic growth of the country, contributes to the growth of the

population and, not the least, compensates, to a great extent, for the loss incurred by emigration of Canadians to the United States."

With more chapter conveners in the provinces and more personal contacts, Mrs. Jennings hailed expanded work and energy in the field of immigration, summarizing the projects carried by the order. Approximately \$8,000 was spent on the work of this department.

**INDIAN AFFAIRS**  
Reporting also for the special Indian Affairs committee, Mrs. Jennings said that five possible projects the IODE could undertake to help the Indian people, the promotion of friendship centres was recommended as the most challenging and offering the greatest scope for work.

Halfway houses, where newly arrived Indians can feel at home and use as a base to move out into community life, have already been established, she said, and the experience already gained will be available to the IODE in the future.

Speaking on the picture of the Indian situation in Canada, Mrs. Jennings "told with the aspects of Indian life, welfare, leadership and integration."

The report of the national committee for "Echoes," the IODE publication, was given by Mrs. E. S. Bray, who noted that the new format of the magazine continued to be popular.

Mrs. Bray spoke of several popular columns and features in the magazine, and dwelt on several articles which she said were "of needful patterns, and advertisements" or articles a chapter might have for sale.

She also stated that during the past year the Kooles committee had asked the provincial committees to ascertain the feeling of members as to replacing chapter notes with annual chapter events throughout Canada.

Also, during the past year it was decided that future chapters should be inserted in the publication following the decrease of circulation.

**Fairclough To Be Guest At S'ide Tea**

**SUMMERSIDE** — The itinerary for the Summerside visit by Hon. Ellen Fairclough, first woman to be appointed to the federal cabinet, and present minister of citizenship and immigration, was announced yesterday in the parliamentary career, Mrs. Fairclough will visit Summerside on Tuesday, June 5, and will be guest of honor at a tea in the Summerside Canadian Legion Home from 1 to 5 p.m.

In private life, in addition to being a housewife and mother, Mrs. Fairclough is a certified public accountant. She is married to Gordon Fairclough who operates a printing company in Hamilton, Ont.

Mrs. Fairclough has held several offices in United Empire Loyals Association and the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire.

She was first elected to the House of Commons in 1959, and served at the United Nations. Throughout her parliamentary career, Mrs. Fairclough has been an advocate of equal pay for women.

The tea at Summerside on Tuesday afternoon will be co-sponsored by Mrs. Donald Laidlaw, Mrs. Russell Crockett and Mrs. Percy Ramsay.
