A Ten Million Dollars Suit.

A San Francisco, Cal., despatch of the 7th inst., says that Judge Sullivan rendered a decision overruling the demurrer in the case of John H. Burke against Jas. C. Flood et al, and allowing defendants twenty days to answer plaintiff's complaint. This action was commenced about eighteen months ago to recover \$10,000,000, the value of Consolidated Virginia stock, alleged to have been appropriated by defendants while directors of the Consolidated Virginia Company. Demurrers were interposed by defendants, pleading the statute of limitations. Judge Sullivan decides all these points against the defendants. The case now rests entirely on questions of fact.

The Nevada Millionaire.

Mr. John Mackey, the Nevada millionaire, passed through St. John a few days ago for Halifax, from which port he will sail for Paris, where his wife lives in a style of magnificence which dazzles the gay French capital. Mr. Mackey made his colossal fortune in the Virginia Consolidated Mining Company, as is well known; his income is said to be \$25 per minute. His personal appearance is as follows: He is tall and not stout; has rather stooping shoulders; wears a dusty black suit of clothes, a small brown moustache, and gold bowed spectacles; has a pleasant expression of face; is a great talker; has a nervous manner and a careworn look. He is apparently about 50 years of age. He is credited with dispensing \$200,000 a year to the poor, and denying it if questioned.

A Forger 72 Years old.

SEVEN INDICTMENTS FOUND AGAINST AN ONTARIO FORGER.
A notorious counterfeiter, named Johnston, was arrested at Unionville, Ont., in June last, for passing a \$1 bogus bill on the Dominion Bank, and his capture proved a most important one. J. W. Murray, Government detective, writes to *Dye's Counterfeit Detector*, that he interviewed the prisoner, who after some talk, told where the plates were to be found. They proceeded to a ravine and found, at the foot of a tree, a small box which when opened, disclosed plates to the number of 21, comprising the front, back and dent plates for counterfeiting bills. The prisoner was lodged in jail, and the plates turned over to the Treasury Department. There were seven bills of indictment found against him by the Grand Jury. Johnston or Anderson as he has lately been known, was born in England and is an engraver by trade; age 72 years; height, 5 feet 7 inches; hair at present gray and shaggy, formerly a dark brown; keen blue eyes now much sunken; very smart and active for his age; stands erect; weighs about 125 lbs. He has been a counterfeit engraver for over 45 years.

Frightful Accident.

OVER 930 PERSONS LOSE THEIR LIVES.
The steamer Jeddah, from Singapore, foundered off Guardafui, on the 8th inst., with 953 pilgrims for Jeddah. All were lost except the captain, his wife, the chief engineer and the chief officer. An engineer and sixteen natives who were picked up were brought to Aden by the steamer Scindia.
These pilgrims were undoubtedly Mohammedans, of whom Singapore embraces in its population about 25,000. Jeddah, or Jiddah, whither they were bound, is a trading town of the Aedjaz, Arabia, and is situated on the eastern shore of the Red Sea, about 60 miles west of Mecca, of which city it is the port. Pilgrims to Mecca are constantly pouring through it, and Mecca was the destination of these pilgrims, who came to their death by being drowned in this stream. Cape Guardafui, off which the vessel foundered, is the most easterly point of Africa, at the entrance of the Sea of Bab-el-Mandeb.

A Desperate Fight with Rats.

A German named Grossman keeps a lager beer saloon in Franklin, Penn. Two of his children were sent into the cellar to get some Swiss cheese, which was stored in a vault formerly used by a brewer. An army of rats disputed their passage, and while the elder of the children fought the other returned to the saloon and screamed for assistance, saying that his brother was in the cellar surrounded by rats. Mr. Grossman and two neighbors armed themselves with clubs and hastened to the rescue of the boy. The sight that met their eyes as they entered the vault was one such as they had never before witnessed. The army of rats seemed to number thousands. The men turned in the contest, but so numerous and persistent were the rats that they were more than an hour in conquering them. Dead rats were piled on every side, and their number was so greatly reduced that the survivors were driven to their holes. Eight hundred and nineteen dead rats were carried from the vault. The carcasses filled a large two-horse wagon box, and were a good load for a team to draw away.

A blast at the Hull iron mines on the 5th dislodged over twenty tons of phosphate, yielding 9 per cent of pure stuff. This is the largest that has yet been made at the mines.

The Pacific Railway.

The Ottawa Citizen of the 11th inst. says: "We learn that a meeting of capitalists, interested in the Dominion Government's offer of a land and money grant to a company for the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway, has been held. Plans and maps showing productive land zones and other important documents have been inspected by the negotiating capitalists. So far there is every prospect that the result will be the formation of a powerful and wealthy syndicate. A conference was held with Sir Charles Tupper, to which explanations were made by the Minister of Railways and his colleagues. It is probable that an interim memorandum will be signed containing a final proposition, and that the Minister will leave England during the latter part of this month."

A Detective Story.

There is a story told of a lady and gentleman travelling together on an English railroad. They were strangers to each other. Suddenly, the gentleman said:—
'Madame, I will trouble you to look out of the window for a few minutes; I am going to make some change in my wearing apparel.'
'Certainly, sir,' she replied with great politeness, rising and turning her back upon him. In a short time he said:
'Now, madame, my change is completed, and you may resume your seat.'
When the lady turned she beheld her male companion transformed into a dashing lady with a heavy veil over her face.
'Now, sir, or madame, whichever you are,' said the lady, 'I must trouble you to look out of the window, for I also have some changes to make in my apparel.'
'Certainly, madam,' and the gentleman in ladies' attire immediately complied.
'Now, sir, you may resume your seat.'
To his great surprise, on resuming his seat, the gentleman in female attire found his lady companion transformed into a man. He laughed and said:
'It appears that we are both anxious to escape recognition. What have you done? I have robbed a bank.'
'And I,' said the wildom lady, 'as he dexterously fettered his companion's wrists with a pair of handcuffs. I am detective J. of Scotland Yard, and in female apparel have shadowed you for two days—now, drawing a revolver, 'keep still.'

Miscellaneous.

Eighty-three head of fat cattle were shipped to England on Saturday last from Quebec.
It is estimated by the London "News" that the cost of a general election in England is about \$5,500,000.
Of some thirteen hundred men employed on the Canada Pacific Railway in British Columbia one half are Chinamen.
Some enthusiastic citizens of Quebec are clubbing to pay the Gas Company for lighting up streets in front of their residences.
This year's yield of tea in India is estimated at 70,000,000 pounds, nearly double that of 1878. Ten years ago it was under 14,000,000 pounds.
The reason why only one garter is given instead of a pair of garters, is because the honor is not usually conferred until the recipient has one leg in the grave.
The Peabody fund at the beginning of the present year has grown from \$2,500,000 to \$3,500,000. The trustees have housed 9,905 persons in 2,355 dwellings.
IN THE TOMBS.—There are twelve men now in the Tombs at New York, on charges of murder. There has never been so many persons in that prison charged with murder before. Jealousy and drink were the causes of the majority of the crimes.
His Eminence Cardinal Manning has written to His Grace Archbishop Lynch to say that he has two thousand orphans for whom he is desirous of getting homes in Canada. These waifs, it appears, have been rescued from the streets and work-houses of London. Their ages range from ten to fourteen years, and as they have already received training, they will not be altogether a burden on those adopting them.

Dr. McLaren, better known as the "Swamp Angel," and a strong advocate of hygiene, says he has outvalled Tanner, having fasted forty-two days and forty-two nights. When a resident of the Province of Quebec, he was located on a farm which was divided from civilization by a river. One day a man called on him and borrowed the only canoe he had. He forgot to return it, and the doctor, not being able to swim, was obliged to fast until assistance came, which was not for 42 days. The only thing he took during that time was water, and occasionally sucked a piece of hemlock bark, which is not very nutritious.
