JUSTIN MCCARTHY delivered his lecture on English Statesmen, Orators and Parties, before a large audience assembled in the Lyceum last evening.

MR. MCCARTHY, on rising, was received with applause. He said: "I will not occupy much of your time in discoursing upon England's statesmen, orators and parties."

Sir,—Your correspondent "Enquirer," in yesterday's EXAMINER asks for information regarding the origin of the phrase "Organized Hypocrisy," now much in use among political writers.

The author of the phrase was Disraeli, the late Lord Beaconsfield and was first used by him in the British House of Commons in 1846 in one of his brilliant and powerful attacks on Sir Robert Peel, during a debate on the repeal of the Corn Laws.
