Prince Street Home And School Ass'n Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the Prince Street School Home and School Group was held on May 15th.
A band concert by the school band under the direction of their instructor, Mr. Ivo Cudmore, was greatly enjoyed by the large meeting.
The minutes were read by Miss Ann Matheson. The chairman of the Nominating Committee, Mr. Bruce McLaren, presented the following slate of officers:

Vice-President — Mrs. G. B. Whiteside.
Secretary — Miss Doris Ferguson.
The retiring president, Mrs. F. M. Nash read her report of the year's work and Col. Lowther expressed the meeting's appreciation to Mrs. Nash for her capable management during the year.
The meeting was then adjourned by the new president, Dr. McVicar.
Following is the President's report:
"This has been an experimental year for Prince Street Home and School Association. We have started in a small way, but I feel we have firmly established our group, and the new executive won't have too much difficulty in forming an active organization."
"Two meetings were held during April and May of last year. Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie gave us an interesting address on the history and development of the H. and S. Association in Canada at the former, and Mrs. J. P. Lantz and Dr. O'Meara were our guest speakers at the latter meeting."
"The teachers served delicious refreshments at our May meeting, which were appreciated by all present."
"We have held five fairly well attended meetings, including tonight's since school opened last fall, but I might say right here that it would be very encouraging to have more fathers at our meetings."
"I only took advantage of the National Film Board once during the season, and I feel more could be done along this line. We certainly appreciate and realize the value of the Board."
"During the season Col. Lowther spoke to us on school routine and modern changes in teaching methods and Dr. McVicar addressed us on Emotional Education. These talks proved to be most interesting."
"A list of names of parents in Prince St. School district was submitted to the Dept. of Education and the City Council for use in appointments to the School Board. Col. Keith Johnson was appointed to the Board by the City Council from this list which was compiled by a committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Reg. Kemp."
"Late in the fall we held a Skate Exchange which was convoked by Mrs. Peake. Although this project couldn't be called a financial success, we did satisfy our customers."
