CONTRACT BRIDGE

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

NORTH: AKQ, 107, J1063, Q862. WEST: J865, KQJ842, 872. EAST: 73, 9853, 954, K1095. SOUTH: 10942, A, AKQ, AJ743.

The bidding: South West North East 1 1 3 3 Pass 3 3 3 3 Pass 6 4

Opening lead—king of hearts. The slam was reached, as it should be in most deals, without inquiring for aces. Natural bidding is the best stepping stone to the great majority of slams that are reached.

The artificial four trump bid to ascertain aces should be reserved for hands where the number of aces held is the key to whether or not a slam can be made. In the present case, South should have no more than a fleeting curiosity about whether North has an ace. With 18 high card points and distributional values facing a hand that is marked to have about 13 to 15 points plus a trump fit, a small slam undertaking is clearly indicated.

At the same time, grand slam thoughts are dismissed from practical consideration because too exact a fit is required to make the play for 13 tricks feasible.

As the adverse cards happen to lie in this deal, declarer cannot afford to get careless in the play for the small slam or he will be defeated.

Thus, if South wins the heart and plays a spade to dummy to lead a low club and finesses the jack, he goes down one. This is because East's K-10-9 cannot then be prevented from taking two tricks.

What declarer should do after crossing to dummy is lead the queen of clubs. This play, if properly pursued, limits East to one trump trick.

The reason for the queen play is logical enough. There are no losers outside of trumps. If the clubs break 2-2 or 3-1, it cannot be important which club is led from dummy, since there can be at most only one trump loser.

But where the clubs are divided 4-0, the contract can fail if the wrong club is led from dummy. Since the contract cannot be made by any means if West has four clubs, the only protective measure available is to guard against East's having all four. The lead of the queen takes care of his possibility.

By ARTHUR GAVSHON LONDON (AP)—Britain Sunday night was reported likely to quit 17-nation talks on the European Free Trade Area (FTA) over differences with France.

A British announcement is expected before Wednesday when FTA negotiations are due to resume in Paris.

Breakdown of the talks, with Britain and France at loggerheads, could pave the way for an economic war splitting Western Europe into two rival trade blocs.

On the one side would be the Common Market project due for launching Jan. 1 by six continental countries—France, Italy, West Germany, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg.

aim would be to break the deadlock centering around conflicting British and French views in Europe's economic future.

If such a conference failed to find a solution or even a stop-gap arrangement to prevent a trade war breaking out, the source said, Britain will consider taking "protective action."

Its aim would be to meet an outbreak of trade discrimination by common market member nations against the rest of Europe. HOPES FINALLY DASHED

Britain's hopes for getting quick agreement on the FTA were finally dashed last Friday by French Information Minister Soustelle.

Soustelle announced it would be impossible to establish FTA on the terms proposed by Britain, but said France still would work for a solution.

Britain's reaction, as expressed by the government source Sunday night, was: "If Soustelle's statement represents official French policy, as we must assume it does, there would seem to be little point in our continuing to take part in the Paris negotiations on their present basis."

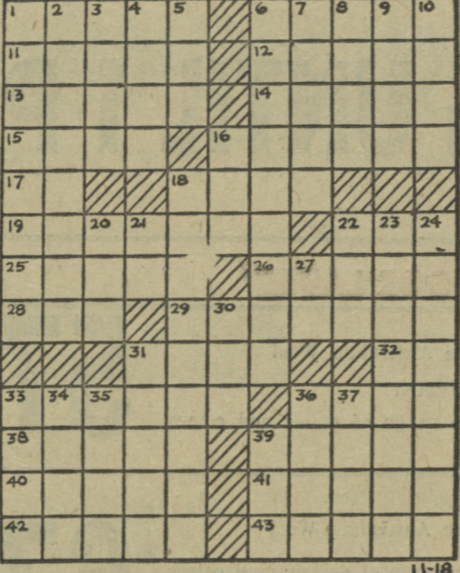
NO COMMENT The foreign office would make no formal comment on the report. Britain's chief negotiator at the Paris talks, Paymaster General Reginald Maudling, is in London conferring with Prime Minister Macmillan and his colleagues.

The common market is a sort of customs union. Its members have agreed gradually to scale down and within 10 to 15 years to abolish all tariffs, customs and other trade restrictions between each other.

At the same time the six will set up a common external tariff, plus certain import quotas, against outside nations. The aim is to protect their own industries against outside competition.
