## Doctors Urged To Support Voluntary Medical Plans

Prince Edward Island medical men were warned that hostility by them to voluntary, prepaid medical plans would lead to government intervention in that field.

The warning was issued by Dr. E. Kirk Lyon of Leamington, Ont., deputy to the Duke of Edinburgh and CMA president as he spoke to the opening session of the P.E.I. Medical Society yesterday.

The two-day provincial medical association meeting got underway with a business session yesterday morning with Dr. J. H. MacLellan presiding.

Text of Dr. Lyon's remarks was released to the press before delivery.

This year, he said, the government has intervened in the field of hospital insurance and the realm of medical practice of those closely associated with hospitals.

**SOME HOSTILE**

"In spite of this increase in

popularity of medically-sponsored health insurance programs in Canada there has been from some of the members of the medical profession a cool reception, in fact, open hostility has at times been evident.

"Labor across this country has been clamoring for years for some type of government health insurance and it is as a professional man that I would like to see the way and supply the need for it. It will be forced sooner or later to meet the demands of their constituents and supply the Canadian people that which we deny them."

Noting provincial governments spent \$52,000,000 in the health field this year, he said the expenditures will probably increase still further as the public demands more and more benefits of health services by government assistance.

"Increases in government spending in the health field may

be considered by some as creeping socialism in our country, but I would remind you again that the improvements we have effected largely by co-operation between government and the organized medical profession.

In the absence of Dr. F. A. MacMillan due to illness, Dr. T. L. Farmer of Charlottetown chaired the luncheon meeting.

The scientific papers, "Management of Patient in Labor 24 Hours" by Dr. R. A. H. Kinch, and "Varicose Veins and Stasis Ulcers" by Dr. L. G. Wilcox were delivered during the afternoon session. Discussions were respectively Dr. J. K. L. Irwin and Dr. M. J. M. Putnam. Dr. J. A. MacLellan was chairman.

In the evening the annual Medical Ball was held at the Charlottetown Hotel.

### FIRE TEST POLARIS

CAPE CANAVERAL, (AP)—

## Minister Of Fisheries, Relates Improvements

**NORTH RUSTICO** — Hon. J. Angus MacLean, Canada's minister of fisheries, said here last night that the Diefenbaker government though in office only two years had already done much for the fishermen of the Atlantic Provinces.

Research is going on continually and two vessels were surveying the fish potential of the Gulf at all times he said. In addition, the federal government was expanding its fish marketing department.

Other speakers at the big Progressive Conservative rally were Philip Matheson and R.R. Bell the two PC candidates in the second district of Queens.

The special grants given to the Maritimes by Ottawa following

the election of the Conservative government were not hand-outs but "justice long overdue," the fisheries minister stated. He added that this was the light in which Mr. Diefenbaker considered them.

### NOT FOOLING VOTERS

The present Liberal policy of laying pavement "helter-skelter and hither and yon" Mr. MacLean said was not fooling the Island voters even for one minute. "To most people it is obvious that they had 24 years in which to do the job."

As part of the long list of benefits that the Diefenbaker government had made possible on P.E.I. Mr. MacLean listed the following: a new airport for Charlottetown; historic park at Fort Amherst; expanded facilities at Summerside air station and two new departments of marine agencies in the capital.

He said that the department of labor and fisheries were co-operating to work a scheme of added unemployment insurance benefits for fishermen.

"By voting PC on September 1 you will assure not only your own future, but also the future of your children and your children's children," the minister declared.

### FREELY, FAIRLY

Mr. Matheson said that it was essential that the island name a government that would co-operate freely and fairly with Ottawa. The present financial aid which amounted to 60 per cent of the local revenue was barely enough to cover essential spending and would never increase with an unfriendly, dog-in-the-manger group such as the last Liberal administration at the helm.

The 1st Queens PC candidate said that despite desperate Liberal attempts to prove the contrary, it was not the federal authorities that had made hospital insurance compulsory for our people.

Had it not been for APEC nothing would have been accomplished on the island in the last few years the PC candidate contended.

Mr. Bell declared that prior to the election all the Liberals had strongly opposed any proposal to grant free text-books to Island children. Only a few months ago the same people who had now committed themselves to this project had described it as "impossible," he said.

Broadening the farm assistance policy to include older age groups had been advocated by many people for a long time Mr. Bell noted. It was only on the eve of an election that the Liberals had agreed, he added.

Messrs. McGuffin and Boyle who denied credit and offered loans in two separate ads in the same paper were a concrete example of Liberal confusion, the PC candidate said.

## Western Prince Neglected Declares PC Leader Shaw

**ALBERTON** — The people of the western part of Prince Edward Island are not receiving their just rights, Progressive Conservative Leader W.R. Shaw said during the course of a vigorous address at Alberton last night.

After September 1st when the Conservative party is elected, we plan to pay particular attention to the needs of Western Prince as regards highways, fishing, farming and tourist promotion, the PC leader stated.

Mr. Shaw repeated criticism made at other recent meetings regarding a Liberal poster entitled "These Are The Facts" which he stated was not only yellow in colour but in material content.

"Unlike the Liberal platform which has seen extravagant promises made daily, we are following very closely the policy laid down at the start of the campaign," Mr. Shaw continued, "and this honest, basic, achievable platform will be put into effect."

The tremendous gatherings at Conservative meetings all over the Island, indicate an upsurge of enthusiasm and interest in the Conservative cause the party leader said. "It is important that we get in line with the government at Ottawa which has saved this province from bankruptcy," he declared.

Other speakers at the overflow meeting in the Institute Hall were Conservative candidates for First Prince, J. W. Don Campbell and Hubert Gaudet, and Mrs. Jerry Peters who addressed the audience in French and English.

Mr. Campbell expressed the regrets of Dr. O.H. Phillips, M.P., who was unable to be present owing to other speaking commitments.

Following the speeches musical entertainment was provided and a delicious lunch served to several hundred people.

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**LONG RIVER** — "The Sunday School's part in the Local Church's Job" and "The Sunday School Does its own Job" were the afternoon and evening discussion themes at the Summerside-Kensington District Sunday School Convention held at Long River United Church on Monday, August 17th.

Lieutenant Byron Clouston of the Baptist Church, Summerside, opened the afternoon session with a thought provoking and inspiring worship service, using as his theme "Appreciation."

Delegates were welcomed by Fred Doughart, Long River Sunday School Superintendent. Roll Call of the Schools showed 41 delegates present, and as they responded, one member from each school gave a brief report of the work done and new equipment obtained. The financial report was given by the Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Louis Cairns, and showed a total of \$112.50 sent to the Maritime Religious Education Council, under whose sponsorship these conventions are held.
