Mr. Abbott Explains. As was the case at Geneva and Anney (where Canada completed a second post-war round of tariff negotiations in 1949), in order to obtain valuable concessions from the United States, Western Europe and other non-commonwealth countries, we agreed to the modification and in some cases to the elimination of certain margins of preference. "Having said this, I want to make it clear that Canada has not abandoned Commonwealth preferences. These preferences have been modified in successive negotiations of trade agreements since 1935, but they are still an important part of our tariff structure."

New Oil Markets. The rate was cut to the full 50 per cent of the 1945 level. Officials believe these reductions will open new markets for Alberta's oil industry in petroleum by-products, and by-products of synthetic rubber at the government's Polymer plant at Sarnia, Ont.

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S'ide Planes Return From Flight To Arctic

The final long distance flying exercise of the current specialist navigation course concluded yesterday morning when three Lancaster aircraft set down at R.C.A.F. station, Summerside after two weeks in the north-land.

The six months course will conclude on Friday and the one American and eight Canadian officers will be able to relax with the satisfaction of being graduated from the top navigation course in the service. Two of the aircraft came direct from Churchill, Manitoba, their operational base, and landed early in the morning after a night trip.

The third plane came in at about 10:30, having stopped over at Ottawa. Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island in the North-West Territory was used as a forward base and here the visiting airmen were pleasantly surprised to find the temperatures only about two degrees below zero.

Only endless miles of ice and snow stretched below the aircraft on these hazardous flights with an occasional break in the ice to relieve the monotony. A full supply of emergency equipment such as snowshoes, toboggans, rifles and axes, as well as Arctic clothing were carried.

Flying Officer J. R. Curtis, A.F.C. of Edmonton, Alta., pilot of the last aircraft in, said that several flights had been made over the North Magnetic Pole but they did not reach the north geographic pole this time.

Praises Course. Captain Bob Hassell, the American exchange officer who is from New York spoke highly of the value of the specialist course and said that it is considered a privilege in the U. S. air force to be chosen to take it. Squadron Leader W. L. Gillespie, who is officer commanding the operation.

During the course flights were made to other parts of Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom as navigation exercises and to visit research and manufacturing establishments of interest. This is the first operation in which three planes have been used. Previously the Lancasters, Zenith and Polaris were the work horses of the course but now Northern Cross has been added to the team.
