170 Representatives Attend Red Cross Meeting

Some 170 keenly interested representatives from all sections of the province took part in the Safety Seminar held yesterday at the Confederation Centre in connection with the annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Division of The Canadian Red Cross Society.

Dr. John Gillis of Eldon, vice-chairman of the Red Cross first aid committee, chaired the Safety Seminar which heard reports on statistics telling of the high incidence of fatal accidents in this province (the highest in Canada in 1963 and 1964) as given by Staff Sgt. Tedford, R.C.M.P. on highway accidents, Michael Campbell on these in industry, John E. Ledgerwood who stated that hospitalization costs of accident cases reached the half-million mark in 1965. Ian R. Rankin on drownings; Kenneth MacKenzie on the losses by fire; and J. W. Rodd on farm accidents.

Outlines of safety education programs being carried on in the province came next on the agenda and were given by Staff Sgt. Tedford, on highway safety; Ed. McCabe for the Charlottetown JC's who sponsor the "Elmer Safety Program" in ten schools in and near the city; Mrs. Anthony J. Arsenault, on Industrial Safety; Kenneth MacKenzie on

discussion groups dealt with the findings from the morning's meeting under six headings: highway, drownings, fire, industry, farm and home and the chairmen of these groups presented their recommendations which are now being studied by the Assessment Board consisting of Judge C. St. C. Trainor, Mrs. Philip Matheson, national president of the Federation Women's Institutes, and Dr. B. D. Howatt who will present their report in the near future.

In the absence, through illness of the president, William A. Currie of Summerside, Judge St. C. Trainor, vice-president of the Canadian Red Cross for this province, chaired the evening session held in the form of a dinner at the Confederation Centre, with an attendance of approximately 220.

The financial statements presented by the Honorary Treasurer, H. R. Carruthers, revealed expenditures of \$6,401, which were in excess of revenue by \$2,783.77.

Jones who is out of the province; First Aid—Dr. W. R. Stewart; Voluntary Services—Mrs. L. E. Prowse; Disaster—Frank J. MacDonald and Awards—Mrs. Benjamin Rogers.

Twenty-two volunteers who qualified as members of the Red Cross "Centenary Club" for having given 100 or more hours of service were presented with tokens of appreciation by Premier W. R. Shaw who is a past president of the P.E.I. Red Cross.

Mooney, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for the Souris branch of the Royal Canadian Legion was presented by Fremont Archer with the "Manning Trophy" for having achieved 123 per cent of the objective at the 1965 blood donor clinic held in Souris, for the second consecutive year.

In accepting the trophy, Mr. Mooney expressed appreciation to the many different organizations and individuals in the Souris area who assisted in achieving such excellent results, and stated that his committee would do their best to come out "on top" again in 1966.

West Prince Highway Plan Receives Strong Support

ALBERTON — Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, at their regular meeting last night, were told that their long proposed plan for a second highway to Western Prince County has received strong support from the Summerside Board of Trade.

The new highway via existing roads at Lot 11 and by bridge to the highway at Cascumpec, is of vital interest to Summerside and Western Prince according to a letter of support received from the President of The Summerside Board, Roy Boates.

Correspondence included letters on the subject from Premier W.R. Shaw, Hon. Henry

Wedge and Prosper A. Arsenault, MLA in response to letters sent recently to 14 government officials.

An updated resolution, the third in connection with the highway, has been forwarded to the minister of highways. A letter from the Charlottetown Board of Trade stressing the necessity of keeping Island scenery beautiful by the removal of dilapidated buildings, junk piles and car bodies was discussed at length; on motion it was approved that a delegation meet with the department of municipal affairs to discuss the matter.

Blair Wilkie, chairman of the education committee reported that a successful panel discussion on agriculture was held in O'Leary Regional High School during education week. Following discussion of park improvements in the area the government is to be asked to enlarge Jacques Cartier Park to include some open field space.

SUMMERSIDE — The death occurred unexpectedly yesterday afternoon of Mrs. John W. Gallant at her home, 332 Second St. here. The doctor was summoned but shortly later she died.
