How would you like to spend a night at Spooks' Nook? There is a hotel by that name 30 miles off the Richardson Highway leading to the ghost town of Chitina, Alaska.

Boat tourists years ago could land in Cardova, visit Chitina by rail, leave by bus and rejoin their boats at Valdez, terminus of the Richardson Highway.

Gone is the railroad that used to carry copper from the Kennecott mines to the refinery and shipping port of Cardova. Gone too, are the other hotels and most of the business places and dwellings of this once thriving town of Chitina.

Like so many other mining centers Chitina has become a Ghost town and the man who runs the post office, drug store, hotel, and what's left of Chitina's former glory, O. A. Nelson, decided the place should live up to its name.

That's about the time Nelson took down the sign Commercial Hotel and replaced it with Spooks' Nook. Another eerie sign tacked to a pair of posts near the terminus of the Egerton cutoff road, reads: "Chitina. Beware the ghosts."

Today Chitina has a population of seventeen whites, mostly prospectors, trappers and road men, and some 60 members of the Copper River Indians occupy a village on its outskirts.

Chitina's leading citizen, the amazing O. A. Nelson, is making the spooky little town pay off in a big way by playing up the spooky angle.

The general store has an annual turnover of between \$85,000 and \$100,000; goods are trucked or flown in every month of the year. The 19-room hotel is always full of guests, "writers, travellers, adventurers and what have you. Mr. Nelson provided the little ghost town with its own hydroelectric plant back in 1917. Its capacity of 20 k. hours takes care of all electrical needs.

The Spook's Nook boasts hot and cold water and flush toilets, thanks to Mr. Nelson who designed a unique municipal water system by piping the water from an out of town reservoir holding a few thousand gallons. From there it is piped to an old locomotive boiler to be heated and returned to the reservoir to heat in turn the pipes leading to the town's various buildings.

Some day you may become a happy wanderer. If you do you'll want to stop at Chitina and spend at least one night in room 13 of Spooks' Nook. You'll also want to meet O. A. Nelson the man who actually made a ghost town live up to its name.
