REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICES — Remembrance Day services at Kensington, with services at the Roman Catholic and United Churches, members of the Canadian Legion and other veterans parading from the Town Hall. have held the Allies to small advances and limited attacks during the last few days.

Part of the supply problem included supplying front-line troops with winter combat clothing. Some American troops on the line had parkas and woollens. Others had only summerweight combat fatigues.

Eighth Army headquarters said combat units estimate that approximately three Chinese Communist divisions face the Eighth Army in Northwest Korea, in addition to North Korean forces. This could be 30,000 troops. A U. S. 1st Corps spokesman earlier this week estimated the number of Chinese Communists on this front at 90,000.
