Dr. Tupper is to-day a conspicuous figure in Canadian politics; in fact, he can not be said to rank second to any living Canadian, either in ability or influence. Perhaps to him, as to Canadians generally, it is a matter of satisfaction that his reputation is not Provincial merely; it extends throughout the bounds of Canada. Dr. Tupper's voice and reasoning have been as potent in Ontario as in Nova Scotia; and it is well that the occasion of the demonstration in Halifax last night is one which moves the whole Dominion to unbounded joy, and makes a new era in the history of our country."

The following paragraph we clip from an exchange, showing that the general belief that our American cousins have a monopoly as tricksters, is not correct:—

"The Turk, grave as he is, can be sharp enough upon occasion, as the British seamen in the Bosphorus have discovered to their discomfiture. The crews of Admiral Hornby's squadron organized a regatta the other day, and invited the sailors of the Turkish ironclads to join in the sport. To the great surprise and chagrin of the English tars, the barge of the Turkish man-of-war "Osmanieh" led the way in the twelve oared race, and reached the goal far ahead of all competitors. The Turks had quietly secreted two extra men, two extra rowlocks and two extra oars in the boat, and as soon as the race began rowed with fourteen oars. When victory was assured the extra men slipped overboard and swam ashore. Thus victory smiles upon the brave."

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

BELGRADE, Sept. 23.
The Servian Government, at the request of a Mahomedan chief, has consented to receive women and children fleeing from besieged towns in north-east Bosnia. Many hundred Mahomedan families have already been received in Servia.

ROME, Sept. 23.
At the next Consistory, on the anniversary of Pope Leo XII., the Nuncios at Paris, Madrid and Lisbon are to be created Cardinals.

NAPLES, Sept. 23.
Last night an eruption of Vesuvius occurred of a moderate and intermittent character. The crater appears nearly full of lava and the activity of the eruption continues to increase.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.
Reports from the Southern sections show a gratifying change for the better.

The deaths at New Orleans yesterday were 40, against 74 on Saturday, and the new cases reported were 67 less.

At Memphis 38 deaths occurred—a slight diminution from the previous day.

Intelligence from the fever smitten cities and towns in Mississippi were alike favorable;

Halifax Welcomes Dr. Tupper.

A grand political demonstration took place at Halifax on the entrance of Hon. Dr. Tupper and James McDonald into the city from their respective constituencies. The streets were crowded with people, and a large number of houses and business places on the route were brilliantly illuminated. Bunting was displayed from three out of every four buildings on the route, and the cheering while the procession was passing was most enthusiastic. The demonstration was the largest of a political kind ever seen in Halifax, being nearly double the length of that rendered to the late Hon. Joseph Howe at the time of the Confederation in 1867. Nearly the whole procession was composed of persons on horseback and in carriages, and it took a little over twenty-five minutes to pass a given point. The rink, a building capable of holding about four thousand people, was crowded to its utmost capacity, and thousands could not obtain admission. Speeches were made by Hon. Dr. Tupper, Hon. Peter Mitchell, Hon. James McDonald, Hon. Senator Muirhead and others.

In the course of his speech Dr. Tupper said:—"We now not only surpassed our opponents in point of numbers, but the Liberal-Conservative party never went into Parliament with such an array of talent to strengthen its hands as is now gathered around it. We have to mourn the loss, it is true, of such men as the Hon. Peter Mitchell, though I do not suppose we will have to mourn his loss long. I believe that his energy and ability will not be long in finding a constituency. We had to mourn the defeat of Sir John A. Macdonald, but I am proud to know that before this he has been elected by acclamation to one constituency, and that twenty others would have been glad to secure the honor to themselves. We have to mourn the loss of such a man as Mr. Palmer, but, on the other hand, Mr. Domville, who is present with us this evening, has been nobly sustained. While some few of our standard bearers have fallen in the battle, and it hardly could be otherwise. Sir John A. Macdonald finds himself with such men as the Hon. James McDonald at his back, a gentleman from whom the confidence of the people of the County of Pictou was withdrawn for a time, but who have once again returned him as their representative; a gentleman who built up for himself a reputation, and obtained for the Province of Nova Scotia an amount of consideration, during his services in Parliament, that has rarely been surpassed. He (Sir John) will also have to support him and the two gentlemen whom you have chosen to be your representatives, Messrs. Richy and Daly, two gentlemen whose position and ability would adorn the representation of any county in the Dominion. Men like Mr. Longley, who, after having adorned the Local Legislature, now carries his ability into the wider field of the Parliament of the Dominion. Under these circumstances Sir John A. Macdonald goes back to the halls of Parliament surrounded by a body of men from Nova Scotia of whom any country in the world might well feel proud. No words that I could utter could express the emotions of my heart at what the unbought yeomanry of Halifax and the other counties of this Province have achieved."
