Rotarians Addressed Water Resources

Ground water resources was the subject of an address by the Hon. V. Brantley of the Geological Survey of Canada, Ottawa, at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. B. Graham Rogers was chairman and R. A. Parent co-chairman.

"Past records have been of great value and interest as we moved forward with our study of ground water resources in this province," the speaker said. "We must not be lulled by the fact that water is abundant there now as it was at the time referred to."

Water was recorded by shading stations on the sites as part of the study. The speaker said that "waters are in effect large ditches towards which all water gravitates. The rocks and sandstone formations on the Island in loose and lends itself to a runoff which may be seen evening out at low tide almost everywhere. There are no underground rivers here," Mr. Brantley said.

Existing wells are not suitable for recovery but are drilled but it is impossible to get a dry well on the island.

Water supply is excellent for towns or industry if wells are not placed too near each other, the problem of one drawing from another is not present," he said.

The speaker observed that along the shore, and in one instance in the city, salt water seeps under the fresh water.

Following the address several members asked questions regarding cutting trees, excessive precipitation and summer heat.

Mr. Brantley was introduced by Mr. Rogers and Mr. Hamilton, President of the club.

Mr. Brantley was educated in England and came to Canada in 1930.

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FEEDING THE TROUT AT CARDIGAN

James Dewar, Brudenell, is pictured feeding several thousand trout at the Cardigan rearing ponds. A total of 750,000 trout and 250,000 salmon are being raised at this hatchery. Each year approximately 1,000,000 trout and salmon are released in Island streams from this hatchery. A 60 by 28 hatchery building is being constructed to assist in this operation. Stanley Freeman is in charge of the Cardigan operation assisted by Mr. Dewar, Thaddeus Shepard and Alex MacDougal. This hatchery has 20 pools and also has 500 year-old trout feeding there. During the later summer months hundreds of visitors take advantage of the opportunity to see these young trout and salmon, before being released in streams.

Australian To Address Trade Board

Scheduled to arrive in Charlottetown early in September, David Brock, Australian High Commissioner to Canada, will address the first general fall meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, it was announced yesterday.

Mr. Brock was named to his present post last year but was familiar with this country before that having served two years in the United States Navy from 1950. A native of New South Wales he received his education at Melbourne and Oxford Universities and has had a long career in the Australian diplomatic service. He has been on postings to Bangkok, Siam, and other eastern countries as well as representing his country at Nigeria and Sierra Leone celebrations on their entrance into the Commonwealth.
