Typhoid fever is on the increase in Fredericton.

Hon. Justice Routhier has ordered that the Island of Anticosti shall be sold by auction.

Sir Richard has relatives in Holland. The Minister of Finance there has a deficit of 2,500,000 florins.

Ex-Senator Conkling has announced his intention of abstaining from any intervention in politics this winter.

This country sent 30,000 head of cattle to the old country markets last year, for which \$3,000,000 were paid to our farmers.

A transport is now on the passage to Halifax to take the crew of the wrecked H. M. S. "Phoenix" to England, via Bermuda.

It is reported that the new mica mine in the Missisquoi district produces specimens equal to the celebrated North Carolina productions.

President Arthur has been ordered by his physician to visit the St. Lawrence to cure malaria. He has been enjoying some bass fishing at Oak Point on the Canadian side.

A Boston commission house writes to a St. John shipper that Boston is "rather stuck" on potatoes, there being a large stock in bulk on the cars and many are rotting badly.

A joint committee of citizens of Windsor and Detroit is endeavoring to prevail upon the Marquis de Lorne and Princess Louise to accept a reception in the latter city on their return from British Columbia.

The camp at Sussex is lively. The Scotts seem to be pretty well enforced in the town but foreign volunteers to-night report that they found a lot of Friar's Balsam which answered the purpose exactly.

Pensacola, which a few weeks ago was one of the most flourishing towns in Florida, is now almost deserted. Seven hundred and thirty-three cases of yellow fever and 78 deaths have been reported within a few weeks.

Cetewayo wished to take presents back to his wives, and the authorities in England made a grant for that purpose, but when it was found that twenty-nine ladies shared the honor, the original sum was increased to \$500.

Sir Charles Tupper seems to have quite regained his usual health, and immediately on his arrival exhibited his characteristic industry by repairing to his office and transacting some urgent official business, which had been awaiting his return.

The barkentine "Ellie D." of Pictou, was driven ashore on the 11th September during a heavy gale, at Santa Anna, Mexico. It is feared she has become a total loss. She was owned by C. Dwyer and others of Pictou, and was insured for \$16,000, partly in Pictou.

A noteworthy thing in connection with American civilization is the fact that a majority of the Japanese students sent to America returned to their native country Christians, while not one such case occurred among those sent to the educational institutions of Germany, France and England.

Two youths of fourteen have come to grief through dime novel reading. One of these heroes by force of imagination hung himself in order to see how it would feel, and hung until there was no feeling left in him. The other accidentally shot his little four-year-old brother, who was representing a particularly terrible and bloodthirsty Indian brave.

The manufacturers of Prince Edward Island are apparently taking the advice of the politically defunct Sir Richard John Cartwright, and they are "spreading themselves" in earnest. The manufacture of tweeds and woollen cloths appears to be making the greatest advancement. A table 75 feet long has been given by the managers of the Charlottetown Exhibition to the woollen manufacturers alone.

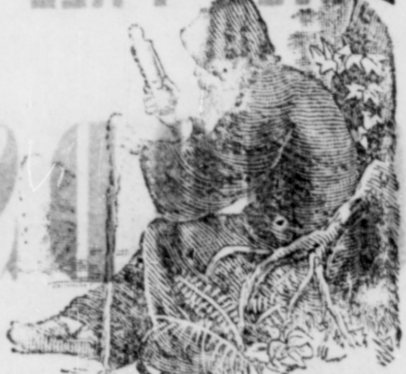
A valuable abstract of the returns issued by the Bureau Veritas shows that the total number of sailing vessels and steamers lost throughout the world during the last two years reaches some three thousand five hundred, and that of these more than three hundred are reported as missing. Among other chances is the one that some of the vessels may have been able to sneak away in an improper condition—perhaps overloaded with an insufficiency of freeboard.

In consequence of the evidence given and the ruling of Judge Weldon at St. John, N. B., on Tuesday last, as to the agency in election business, the counsel for Mr. Foster, M. P., admitted that money had been spent by persons who might be considered friends of the respondent, and expressed their willingness that his honor declare the seat vacant. The opposing counsel agreeing, his honor declared the seat vacant but said it was clear to him that Mr. Foster was not guilty of any corrupt practices.

The bridge which is to be erected across the Forth will be one of the greatest scientific achievements of the century. The main girder will be within a few feet of a mile in length. The bridge is to rest on round cylindrical piers, each weighing 16,000 tons, to which must be added 8,000 tons, the estimated pressure on the top of the pier of the superstructure, rolling load and wind pressure. This gives a pressure at the base of about 24,000 tons, or about six tons per square foot. The foundation is clay and is considered excellent. Steel will be used in the construction of the bridge, the amount required being about 42,000 tons, and the estimated cost of the bridge is \$7,500,000.
