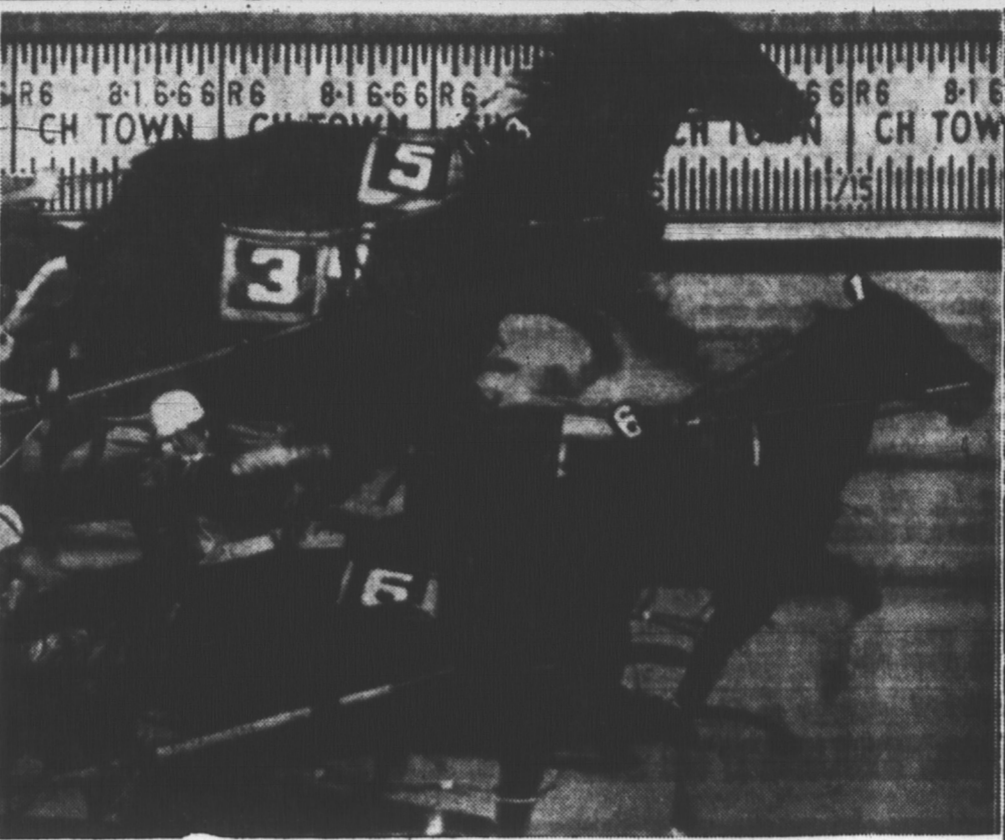
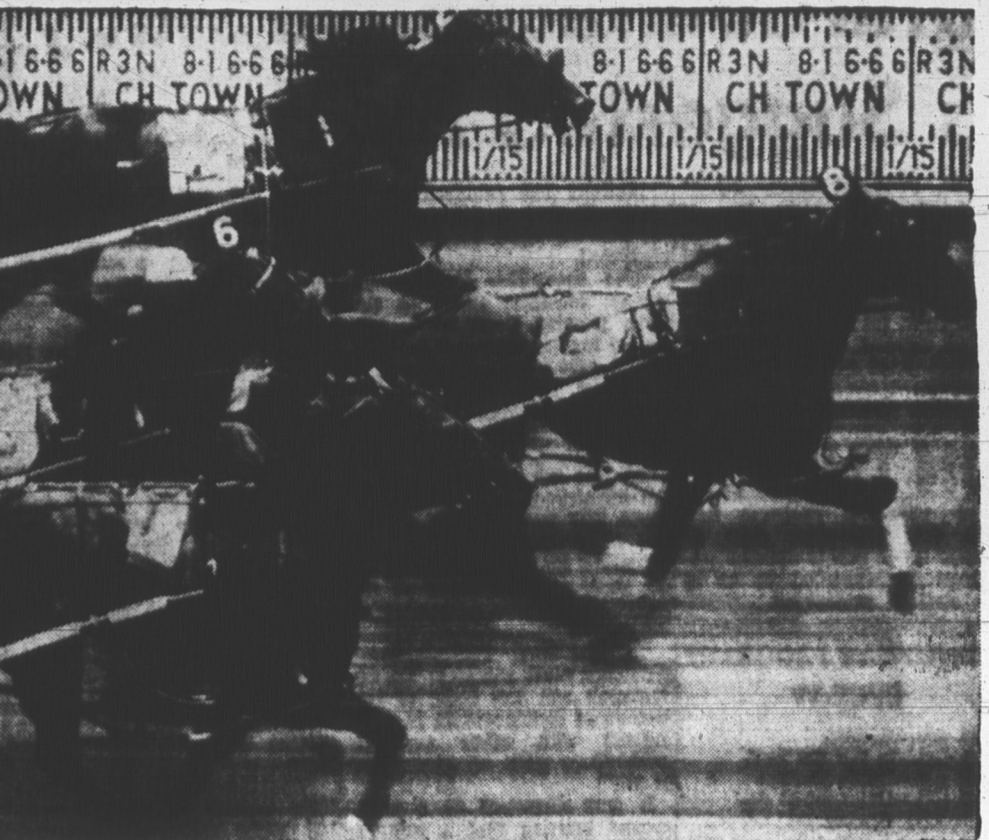

# Little Art Shatters Mark In Local Harness Action

An expectant hush fell over the stand at the Charlottetown Driving Park last evening as the entries in the Free-For-All trot came to the wire but by the time the field had reached the quarter mark fans had already started an electrifying chant.

For Little Art, owned by George Semple of Kensington had stayed flat and by the time that the time for the quarter, 30 seconds flat, had gone up on the board, everyone in the Park was aware of the fact that there was going to be a full scale assault on the track record, held by another Little Art in the field Topway. At the half the Alyre Pineau driven gelding had left the field far behind and as the time 1:02 went up on the board so did an increasingly loud volume of sound from the packed stands.

On and on went the game little trotter, seemingly as swift as the stiff wind at his back on the backstretch and then he turned the last corner for the straight home with the wind in his face.

For a minute or so following there was a poignant silence in the track but when the time of 2:06 was posted there was a standing ovation for Little Art and his trainer driver Pineau. The time eclipsed the old mark of 2:06.3 and waves of applause beat down on Pineau as he accepted a cheque from Race Classifier Frank Acorn for shattering the old mark.

Topway placed second in this opening dash.

Little Art walked off with a 1-1 summary in the twin dash as he also led the field in the second heat with a time of 2:08.1. Topway was second in this heat for a 2-2 summary.

Fans almost paid more attention to a heated chase between a stray skunk and a hoard of youngsters. However, it could be that some of the horsemen were not quite so amused as there were five false starts due to horses breaking in the next three dashes.

Lady Tipton got the evening off to a fine start taking a win over Maynard's Missy despite a stiff wind from the west that hindered the times all evening. Combined with the win of Little Art in the second, the first double was good for \$12.50. The quinnella on the

next dash brought about more than a minor surprise as Garth's Best came home in front of the field that saw five horses in the photo at the wire. However Emily Hal nosed out favored Marctona for place and the resulting quinnella pay was \$53.20.

After placing fourth in the opening heat on the card Federal's Best came back in the fifth to defeat Lady Tipton at the wire and combined with Marctona for a second double.

Next feature event on the card was the exactor and for the longshot bettors this was a disappointment as it returned only \$19.10 for the 1-2 finish of Lord Adios and Mystery Mite. Transporter, after finishing third the first time out came back to take the sixth dash and combined with the win of Peter's Model in the seventh paid \$60.00 in the second double. ## Leaf Stars Deny Clique

TORONTO (CP) — Bob Pulford and Frank Mahovich, stars of Toronto Maple Leafs, disagree with their coach Punch Imlach that a clique of players is causing dissension on the National Hockey League team.

Imlach said Monday that Eddie Shack's demotion to Victoria of the Western Hockey League was the first step in a purge of Leaf players.

The coach said the clique, of which Shack was a member, was responsible for the team's poor showing in last spring's Stanley Cup playoffs.

"I was amazed when I heard stories about cliques," Pulford said in an interview.

"Heck, I talked to Punch yesterday. There was no suggestion that I was a trouble-maker and was on the trading block. Punch and I discussed a number of things. There was a mention of Shack, but nothing about dissension or cliques."

Mahovich also expressed surprise at the reports.

"I've never heard or seen anything of the sort. Of course, I've had disagreements with Punch, but no more than anyone else."

"As far as I'm concerned, relations were the same last year and are the same now as they've ever been."

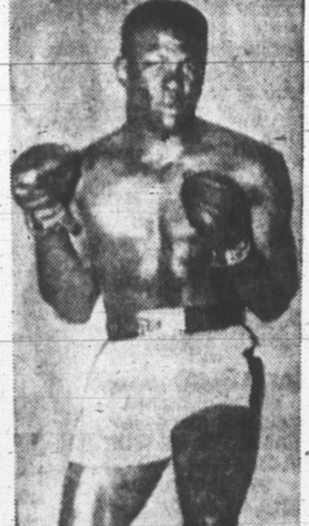
# Fighter Of The Month Loses His Championship

NEW YORK (AP) — Emile Griffith got a pat on the back and a knock on the head by Ring magazine Tuesday when the publication released its monthly ratings.

Griffith was named the Fighter of the Month for July for retaining his world middleweight championship by outpointing Joey Archer in a 15-round title bout. At the same time, Ring removed Griffith as the welterweight titleholder based on the action of the New York State Athletic Commission and other groups which do not permit a champion to hold more than one crown at one time.

Following are ring's ratings of the Champions: Heavyweight, Cassius Clay; light-heavy, Jose Torres; middleweight, Emile Griffith; welterweight, title vacant; Josselin; junior welterweight, Sandro Loppolo; lightweight, Carlos Ortiz; featherweight, Vincente Saldivar; bantamweight, Fighting Harada; flyweight, Walter McGowan.

Canada has George Chuvalo in the heavyweight and Blair Richardson in the ring standings, both ranking tenth. Chuvalo is a heavyweight and Richardson is a middleweight.

## 26 Break Eighty at Women's Open

 HALIFAX (CP) — Twenty-six golfers, led by Gail Harvey Moore's par 70, broke 80 in the 18-hole qualifying round of the Canadian women's open golf championships Tuesday and six others shot 80 or 81 to earn the 32 match-play berths.

Mrs. Moore, a tall, hard-hitting brunette from Scarborough, Ont., shot par 34 on the front and 36 on the back nine of the rolling, 5,325-yard Ashburn Club course to break the record of 71 set by Mrs. Douglas Sharpe of Fonthill, Ont. in 1961.

She was one stroke up on Marilyn Palmer of Kamloops, B.C., winner of the national close title in neighboring Dartmouth last week. Joanne Gault of Regina, one-under-par on the front nine, carded an over-all 72 to take third spot among qualifiers.

The cutoff broke evenly at 81, with no sudden-death playoffs required to select the last entry in the first round of match-play competition today. The field will be halved heading into two rounds Thursday with only four survivors going on to the championship semi-finals Friday.

The two-player match for the Duchess of Connaught Gold Cup is a 36-hole contest Saturday.

# Orioles Defeat Sox; Pirates Shutout Mets

BOSTON (AP) — Ninth inning home runs by Boog Powell and Bob Johnson boosted Baltimore Orioles to a 6-4 victory over Boston Red Sox Tuesday night.

Rookie Darrell Brandon was pitching a three-hitter and leading 4-1 going into the ninth. But after Russ Snyder and Frank Robinson opened the ninth with singles, Powell lined his 31st homer of the year and fourth in two days, tying the game.

Then Curt Belfry was safe on George Smith's throwing error and Johnson followed with his first homer of the year.

It was the fourth straight victory for the American League leading Orioles and their seventh triumph in the last eight games.

NEW YORK (AP) — Tommie Sisk pitched a two-hitter, scored the first run and drove in the second as the National League leading Pittsburgh Pirates defeated New York Mets 3-0 in a rain-shortened game Tuesday night.
