Last Sunday a highly successful "Gymkhana" was held by the P. E. I. Motor Sport Club on the parking lot of Athena Regional High School in Summerside. This was only the second event of its kind to be held on the island, the first being in Charlottetown last August.

A large crowd, numbering upwards of 200, watched drivers from various parts of the Island put their cars through a series of tests laid out on the parking lot. The cars were driven, one at a time, in and out of "garages" (marked out with quart oil cans), around pylons and through various other tests of the driver's skill, including much reversing.

The cars ranged in size from very small ones such as an Austin 850, through the medium class including Valentins, etc., right up to the largest and most powerful Pontiacs, Oldsmobiles. The cars were divided into classes according to wheelbase, and thus drivers competed against similar sized cars, and the organizers, using a formula, finally produced from the class winners an overall "Best Performer of the Day".

Most of the cars were driven with spirit but without undue fireworks, but one piece of excitement came when one competitor, driving a very powerful Oldsmobile, arrived at the finish line sideways! NEW YORK (AP)—Buckpasser easily won the \$54,600 Lawrence Realization at Aqueduct Wednesday to run his winning streak to 11 in a row and his career bankroll to \$1,147,049.

The three-year-old colt, owned by Ogden Phipps, was five lengths back at the head of the stretch. By the 16th pole under the mid urging of jockey Brando Baeza he was in front. At the finish, the son of Tom Fool by Busanda was 2 1/2 lengths ahead of George Widener's Ring Twice, who had taken the lead at the head of the stretch. Phipps, an entry with Puckpasser, was third after setting the pace for most of the 1 1/2 miles over a sloppy track.

Buckpasser ran the distance in 2:24 1/5 and paid \$2.40 in the win-betting only race. In gaining his 20th triumph in 85 starts, Buckpasser strengthened his claim to 1966 Horse of the Year honors.

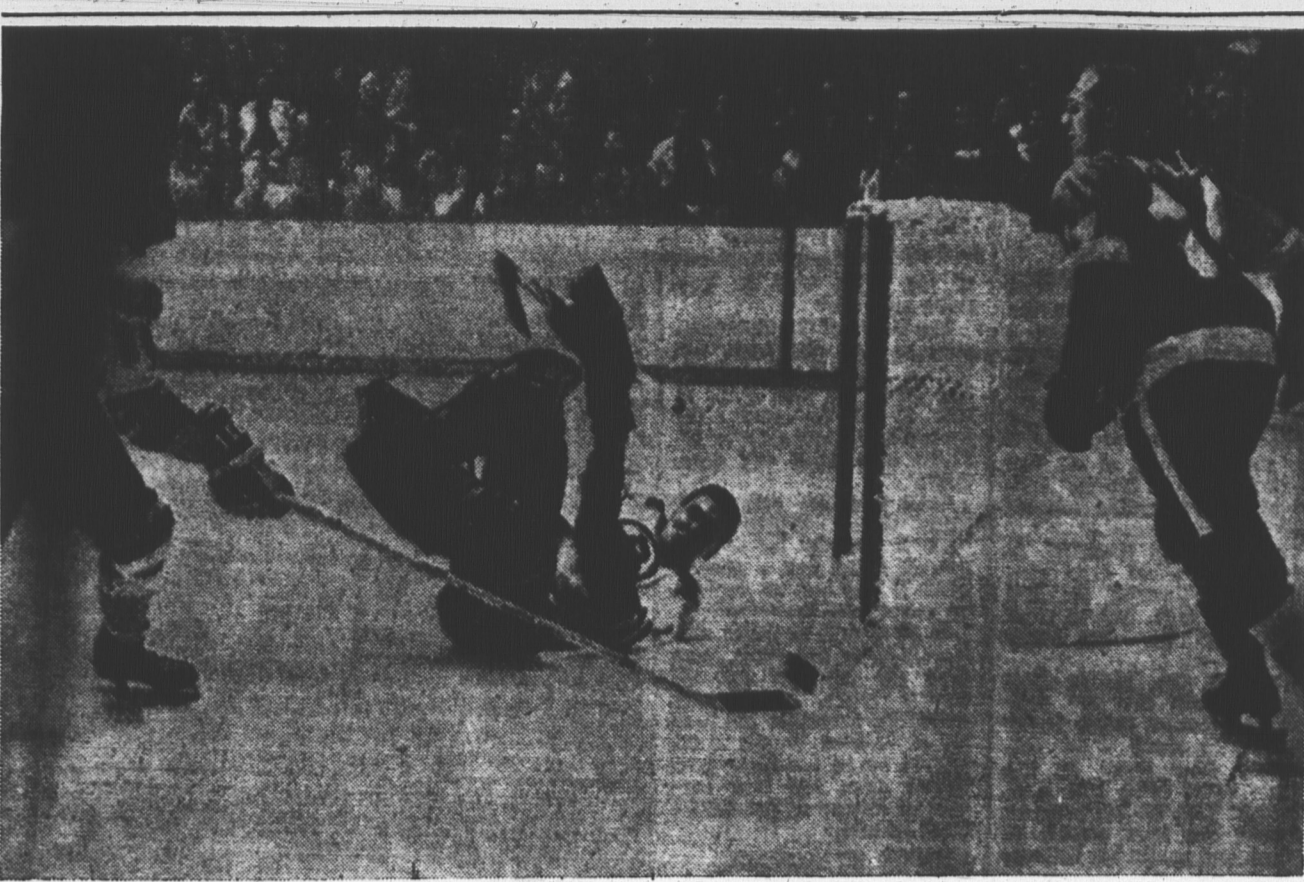
Pittsburgh's other goal was scored by Ted Taylor in the third.

The United States and France are also favored in the four-day, 72-hole event in which the best two scores of three-player teams count daily toward the overall total.

The French, led by young Catherine Lacoste, won the inaugural tournament two years ago in Paris, beating the Americans by a stroke, 588 to 589.

Mrs. Wells, a three-time U.S. Women's Amateur champion, said: "We are expecting great things of the baby of our team, Shelley Hamlin."

Miss Hamlin, a 17-year-old California high school senior, was a last-minute substitute for Mrs. Don Carner, the former Jo-Anne Gunderson of Massachusetts.

PLAYED TWO YEARS AGO

The third member of the U.S. team is Mrs. Theodore Boddie, the former Barbara Fay White of Louisiana, the only player back from the 1964 team.

The French are fielding the same trio which won in Paris:

Bridgitte Varangot, twice winner of the British Women's title, and Chaldine Cros, who has captured titles in both France and Germany, plus the bouncy, long-hitting Miss Lacoste, 21-year-old daughter of the famed French Davis-Cupper Rene Lacoste.

The tournament will be played over the relatively flat, 6,250-yard Mexico Country Club course.

Canada is rated a strong threat, as also are Australia, New Zealand and the combined British-Irish team.

The Canadians are headed by Mrs. Marlene Stewart Streil, winner of both the British and American titles and an international standout for years. Her mates are Mrs. Gail Harvey Moore, a pretty Vancouver school teacher, and Gayle Hutchins, not long out of junior ranks.
