S' side Council Arranges Real Estate Valuation

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening met briefly and approved three resolutions.

One of these approved the appointment of two Charlottetown men, Mr. Arthur Belcher and Mr. Walter Grant, as valuers for a survey to be made by them of all real estate in Summerside. Total remuneration for the work of these men will amount to \$6,000 and it is expected the work will be completed about the end of the present year.

Mayor W.A. Currie said the newly appointed valuers are experienced in this work, and that the method of evaluation

will approximate that used in Charlottetown in a recent revision of property evaluation.

Coun. Dr. H.E. Clark said that it appeared difficult to find persons in Summerside qualified for this task, and mentioned the criticism which might be directed at a local man assigned with this responsibility should someone unfairly charge him with showing partiality in regard to property valuation of any individual.

The council also appointed a three-man board of appeal for real estate, personal property and poll tax for 1957. Mr. Neil MacLeod was named chairman

of the appeal board. The other J. A. MacNeill and J.B. Connell.

In the third item dealt with the council accepted the tender of Willard MacDonald Ltd. in the amount of \$7,000 for supplying a truck for the Summerside Street Department.

Councillor Leo Wood said that tenders had been received from all except one Summerside dealer. He said the lowest tender meeting the required specifications had been accepted, and the truck in question was a 1956 three ton vehicle which, in addition to other duties, would be used in the work of snow removal.

Ask Commercial Fishermen Get Angling, Hunting Licenses

A meeting of the west prince branch of the P.E.I. Fish and game Association was held in the Alberton library Thursday evening with an excellent attendance. President Joseph Macdonald presided.

The financial statement showed a balance of \$56.46 on hand. Following a lively discussion, it was generally agreed that only a few pheasants remained in the area but that the Hungarian Partridge were showing signs of making a come back. Several large coverts were reported.

On motion it was approved that commercial fishermen be obliged to obtain a hunting and angling license as well as their regular commercial fishing license which costs twenty five cents, and a resolution to this effect is to be drawn up. Arguments in favour of the motion were that any person who went out lobster fishing for a day could buy a commercial fishing license and was then not obliged to purchase a hunting and angling permit; also that the work of the game protection officers was made more difficult by reason of the commercial fishing license serving a dual purpose.

A discussion was held regarding the enclosing of a section of the Kildare River marshes by a member of the association. Under the Game Act persons are prohibited from hunting, trapping and trespassing on any enclosed property. It was generally agreed
