## Disarmament Is Before UN Again

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)

The perennial disarmament question came back to United Nations headquarters Wednesday as the special Hungarian debate continued in the General Assembly in much the same style as had been forecast at its inception.

Britain's Cmdr. Alan Noble urged the assembly to vote for the new British-American resolution which calls for further condemnation of Russia and the Hungarian Communist government for its action during and since last autumn's revolt.

He also joined the United States in urging that a special UN representative seek out leaders behind the Iron Curtain for talks on ending the "brutal repression" in Hungary.

But as he spoke on the assembly floor, the five-power UN
