City Man Fined Under School Act

Hassen Haddad of Charlottetown was fined \$10 and costs or five days by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, in city police court yesterday. He was charged under the School Act for not sending his son to school the proper number of school days required by law. The boy is twelve years old.

Michael Quinn of Charlottetown was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failing to stop at a red traffic light. Three men pleaded guilty to charges of being drunk and in capable and two were fined \$20 and costs or 20 days each, while a third was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Regarding failure of Council to purchase the about properties because the finance committee felt the asking price of \$30,000 was too high, Mayor Gaudet noted the new assessment being made for the committee would show an assessed value of \$46,800, and he wondered how the committee would justify this assessment if an appeal were taken. Holiday Closing Dates Announced

Government departments, stores, offices, schools and universities will close on various dates for the rapidly approaching Christmas holidays.

The Customs office will be closed on Christmas Day, but will operate with a reduced staff on Boxing Day for the convenience of the public. Although Dec. 27 has been declared a public holiday for the federal government offices, customs will remain open with a full staff on Boxing Day. The office will close and it has been reported that the department heads are considering closing on Jan. 2, but no final decision has been reached as yet.

George W. Chastler, manager of the National Employment Office, said this morning that a staff holiday for the federal office will close Christmas Day, Friday, Dec. 27; Jan. 1 and Jan. 2.

The City administration offices will be closed Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. John Butler, city comptroller, reported this morning.
