OBITUARY.

There died at Dundas, on Friday the 15th day of April, after an illness of four months, of paralysis, Samuel Macdonald, Esq., Clerk of the County Court, aged 73 years. Mr. Macdonald was born in Scotland, and at the age of sixteen years, with his parents emigrated to this Island. At the age of 21 he went to the United States, and after passing several years there he returned, having met with a fair measure of success. Upon returning to this province he engaged in the lumber trade, at that time a profitable business as it formed the principle export between the Island and the United States.

At this time he purchased the American schooner C. duce, for the knee trade, which for some time proved remunerative. He afterwards removed to Red Point, near Souris, and engaged in mercantile pursuits and some ship building—the last vessel built being the Hudson in 1862—the sails of which at that time cost more than the hull on account of the Civil war.

Over twenty years ago Mr. Macdonald moved to Dundas. He was postmaster in all 42 years, and his name is among the oldest in the magistracy. He was for many years back a surveyor of shipping for King's County. He was always an ardent worker and supporter of the Liberal Conservative party, and looked upon "Canada's greatest statesman," Sir John A. Macdonald, as the most far-seeing man that ever swayed the destinies of Canada.

A man of peace he endeavored to promote and maintain peace. Cool and level-headed—a friend to his friends and just to all—he stood four square to every wind that blew. The needy never appealed to him in vain. As a tower of strength in the church, as a friend to every laudable endeavor, he will be missed; and we may long look for his equal, but long in vain. He was a member of Presbyterian church for over thirty years. He leaves a family of six daughters and three sons to mourn their loss—some of whom come afar only to see the tenement where the spirit had once dwelt.

A large number of Freemasons were present, and the officers and members of St. George's Lodge, of Georgetown, in full regalia. Orient Lodge, of Souris, was also well represented. The casket with its floral tributes was borne from his late residence to the cemetery by those to whom he was so attached in life. Daniel F. Macdonald, High Sheriff of King's County, acted as grand marshal, and the solemn and imposing ceremony was performed with military precision. To his partner in life, who survives him, we tender our unfeigned sympathy.

As we stood at that open grave of a dear friend and sighed within ourselves, farewell brother! we involuntarily exclaimed "Sic transit gloria mundi;" and as the solemn procession wended their way back towards the house of mourning, and finally all wended their way along the streets, I bethought with me, "What shadows we are and what shadows we pursue."
