Storms and floods* are reported throughout England.

The United States public debt was reduced during September \$8,974,891.68.

The Hungarian budget shows a deficit of upwards of twenty-five million florins.

Her Majesty, at the express wish of Mr. Gladstone, will re-open Parliament in person.

An Alexandria despatch reports the rising of the River Nile progressing satisfactorily.

It is rumored in England that Prince Gortschakoff, Mr. Gladstone and M. Gambetta will meet at Nice next month.

£1,000 to £2000 was laid against Trickett yesterday, and £5,000 offered on Hanlan by the same party at a trifle longer odds.

Dr. Nish, attending the Presbyterian Synod, Philadelphia, reported that the Presbyterians had, in Australia, 430 congregations.

It is estimated that there have been 3,800 cases of epizootic among the horses in New York city. Many of the fastest trotters in the city have had the disease. Mr. Bonner's stables have not yet been attacked.

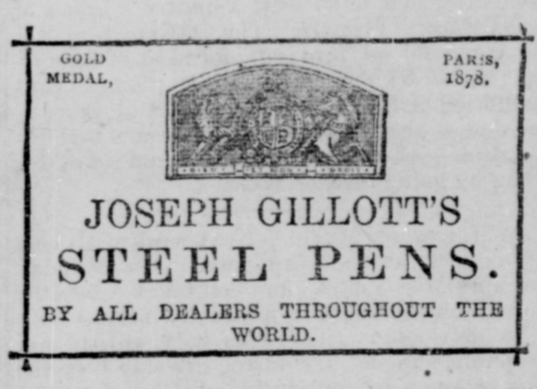
