

Ministers Owe To Members Information On Departments

OTTAWA (CP) — Deputy speaker Lucien Lamoureux said the Conservative MPs have a right to an accounting from ministers on the status of the government's spending in Parliament this session.

He made the ruling in the third day of debate on a bill for 1965-66 in the interim government spending authority when Jack Horner (PC — Acadia) said he would like to see the Deputy Minister's Administration of the Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act.

George McLeith, president of the Privy Council, said the minister piloting the interim supply bill through the House, Jack Pridmore, had been approved earlier in this session by the House.

Mr. Pridmore said the House could not reopen a discussion already voted on. But Mr. Horner said he would like to discuss the future of ARDA, now under Mr. Sauve's direction, and not its past under Mr. Turner.

The deputy speaker said opposition members have the right to discuss the administration of ministers whose appropriations have not been before the House for detailed debate. He said Mr. Horner should be given some leeway.

QUESTION ON DEBATE
Mr. McLeith with questioned Mr. Horner's right to discuss the interim spending bill should be given some leeway in discussing the whole range of government spending. If that was to be the case, he asked why the Commons Leader Dieffenbaker had promised to facilitate quick passage of the bill if the House would postpone the flag debate until the autumn.

"Come over here and we'll discuss that," said Conservative whip Eric Winkler (Grey-Elgin).
"Surely we are entitled to discuss the administration of a minister whose appropriations haven't yet been before the House," said the Conservative House Leader Gordon Churchill (Windsor — South Centre).

"Where is the minister?" Mr. Hays said Mr. Sauve, absent from the Commons Wednesday, had discussed the ARDA program fully when agriculture estimates were before the House.

When Mr. Horner said he wanted to discuss the future of ARDA, Mr. McLeith said Mr. Horner had been on a holiday when the ARDA appropriations were passed July 10.

PUTTING IN A CROP

angler told me he spent an afternoon at Whitlock with a V. S. tourist. The only offering they even recognized, and he had the 'caterpillar' at his disposal, was a midge so small the maker's eye had trouble finding it on the palm of his hand. He didn't have it very long. A trout, estimated in the pound, was hooked, bracket, grabbed it. After a tough battle this trout was near the boat, almost within reach of the landing net, when the hook snapped at the barb. Later a pair of three quarters pounders were creel'd. I heard that Dr. West MacDonald, City boatman, had a limit of twenty one afternoon. The largest weighed two and a half pounds and a Whitlock trout of that poundage is a regular Jack Dempsey among trout.

Some covets of Buns are showing up... as reported to date... in the general Waterside area. The six covets aforementioned are located in the area of Queens County between Winsloe and Cherry Valley. I understand that southern Kings is making an even better showing with regard to Buns but the location of the covets has not been pinpointed.

By late August or early September the Hun crop should be pretty well established. To date there has been no word any pheasant cocks but, as a rule, pheasant cocks do not crop unless they have something to crop about.

The opening of the rabbit season is now three months away with the rabbit crop something like our black duck outlook, no one seems sure where the ball is going to bounce. With the black ducks it's not a question of breeding pairs, it's a question of how many of them will produce broods. Biologists are convinced that the heavy spraying of marshes, etc. has had the effect of reducing numbers of black ducks hatched. They will mate, lay eggs and go through the motions of incubating but it is lost labor.

This could apply to other species of ducks apart from black ducks. It is the highly bred black mallard, as some hunters call them, that hold the spotlight at the moment.

I have spent considerable time this summer in the woods and swamps and have spotted only three rabbits and they were all adults. I have chattered with wood cutters in Kings county and they report seeing more coves of 'Native'.

Winter the only place they saw any number of tracks was in the large swamps and in the country sections where they shed their trade of pulp cutting.

Observers Asked To SIU Parley

MONTREAL (CP) — Charles Turner, president of the Seafarers' International Union of Canada (Ind.) has invited the Canadian Labor Congress (CLC) to appoint observers to attend the next SIU elections.

In a letter sent Tuesday to Donald MacDonald, secretary-treasurer of the CLC, Mr. Turner said though the election will be under the general supervision of the maritime trustees "it is important that the process be scrutinized carefully at all stages."

This election will be the first since the SIU, along with other maritime unions, was placed under federal government trusteeship last October.

In his letter, Mr. Turner also said that if the CLC approved, they could invite the various federal political parties to send observers, "in view of the understandable interest of members of the House of Commons in the results of their trusteeship actions."
