

QUESTION OF LEADERSHIP

DISCUSSING the question of a new Leader for the Conservative Party the Montreal Gazette says: "The party, according to present indications, will be stronger in the new than it was in the old Parliament. If it has lost some good men, it has gained others. It has in its ranks the first parliamentary orator in Canada. It has in Parliament several men whose record justifies the statement that they are quite as promising as was Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1878 or even in 1882. One, besides showing himself to be a courteous and broad-minded public man, has established a reputation as a constitutional authority who can stand on a fairly equal footing with Mr. Mills. A party leader's great work is done in Parliament. Those who sit in Parliament day after day watching the development of politics and arguments are those who can best discharge the duty of selection. When this duty is discharged, the new leader will not be alone. He will have as advisers and lieutenants a goodly number of capable men, from each of the geographical divisions of the country. They will have both courage and hope on their side, because, supported by the traditions of an honorable and useful party career, they will be leading a Government whose success in a dangerous role has startled even its own members with the spectre it has raised. The public spirit of Canada is broader than any province, deeper than any racial appeal can reach. When it next asserts itself it will be found on the side of the political party which has done most for Canada, because from the first, under Sir John Macdonald, to the last, under his old and trusted lieutenant, it has been a national party, seeking by the cultivation of the broadest national ideas, to realize the highest national good."

THE STAMPEDE IN QUEBEC.

Here is one of the arguments used in Quebec. It was presented by Mr. Monet, and was circulated throughout the province:—

"The most important issue before the electors is the question of Imperialism. In the future if you elect a partisan of the Conservative party, of Sir Charles Tupper, Canada will have to contribute to every important war of the Empire.

"If war were to break out with France or Russia, we would have to send at least one hundred thousand men. Where would we find them?

"They would resort to conscription, and I would submit to you ladies here present, that they would come into your homes, carry off your husbands, your beloved sons; young girls, they would carry off your lovers, to fight in a war in which this country had no interest. I am opposed, as I always have been, to any contribution on the part of Canada to any war of the Empire, whether great or small, wether just or unjust.

"I denounce this policy of assisting Great Britain. I still have con-
