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Increased Money Voted At Montague School Meeting

The rate payers of the school district of Montague met for the annual school meeting at the Montague High School last night, with Mr. A. D. MacLure presiding as chairman.

Mrs. Arthur Fraser was appointed as secretary for the meeting. The minutes of the last annual meeting and the last special meeting were read by the secretary, Mr. Lester MacLeod, and approved.

The annual report of the trustees was read by the chairman of trustees, Mr. Charles Fraser, which showed many improvements made to the school during the year.

The financial report was read by Mr. Lester MacLeod, which showed receipts of \$7141.50, expenditures of \$7874.30. As of the time the books were closed.

Mr. A. D. MacLure gave the auditors report, and was re-appointed as auditor for the coming year.

Mr. H. J. Hynes, Supervisor, presented the inspectors report. It was moved that a minimum of \$4200.00, to a maximum of \$4700.00 be voted for the teachers supplements. Last year the supplement vote was \$4175.00.

The vote for running expenses was increased from \$3500.00 to \$3550.00.

Mr. Charles Fraser, the retiring trustee, who had been in office as chairman on the board for one year, was re-appointed as trustee for a three year term.

It was moved by Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, that the meeting give the trustees power to have the principal of the school hold monthly meetings of the school staff to discuss common interests, institute weekly examinations, conduct discipline in the school and on the playground and to send monthly reports home to the parents. This motion met with the approval of the meeting.

Dr. MacKenzie also moved that the meeting go on record as desirous of having a music teacher for the school at Montague, and also for the schools in the outlying districts, this teacher to be a permanent member of the staff, travelling from one school to another in the district to teach music.

Owing to high enrollment in the school, the question of erection of a regional high school in this district was discussed. A committee including Dr. G. S. A. Inman, Ralph Beck, C. J. Fraser, Hon. Kell Clark, M. L. A. Lorne Wriginton, Rev. P. N. Young, and Mrs. A. D. MacKenzie, was appointed to determine a policy of action and the feeling of the people in respect to this grave matter. A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Harold Landry for his nine years of service as teacher of Grade Eleven. Mr. Landry is now employed with The Guardian Publishing Company.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the minutes were read by the secretary.

Following the school meeting a short meeting was held to appoint referees for the Domestic Animals Act.

Those appointed include Messrs. Les MacDonald, Russell MacGregor, and Samuel Reid. There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

loving nations. The Canadians and Australians were fighting as part of the 27th Commonwealth Brigade at the time. The citation honored them "for gallantry, determination and esprit de corps in accomplishing their missions under extremely difficult and hazardous conditions."

With the American company, the two Commonwealth units were credited with blunting and halting a deep penetration which endangered the entire U. N. line in the central sector. Their action is believed to have been decisive in the final defeat of the initial Communist spring offensive.

The citation gave some details of the action: "Towards the close of the second day, April 25, the enemy break-through had been stopped. The seriousness of the breakthrough on the central front had been changed from defeat to victory by the gallant stand of these heroic and courageous soldiers."

Front-line dispatches at the time said the 27th Brigade was placed squarely in the path of the Reds and stopped them, enabling the 1st U. S. Marine Division to complete its withdrawal.

An account of the Patricia's action said they fought until their ammunition was gone, then hurled bayoneted rifles like spears at the enemy.

a minor split in the ranks of Liberals and Progressive Conservatives. Members voted 144 to 24 for a motion to go into committee to consider a resolution to the bill providing for the salary increases.

Most Liberals and Progressive Conservatives voted for the motion. They were opposed by the C. C. F. and Social Credit groups, John Sinnott (L-Springfield); Douglas Harkness (PC-Calgary East); R. H. McGregor (PC-York East); Percy Black (PC-Cumberland); P. E. Gagnon (Ind.-Chilcutin) and Dr. R. Poulin (Ind.-Beauce).

Following the vote, the resolution was adopted and the bill based on it was introduced and read a first time. It will come up for debate tomorrow.

Criminal Code Bill Earlier, Mr. Garson won approval of a bill making a series of changes to the Criminal Code. He acceded to a Progressive Conservative request and withdrew a section which would have allowed police to check on telephone calls from places suspected of being gambling houses. He said the Government will reconsider the section.

Approval was given to a new Dairy Products Act revamping Federal control over dairy products and their substitutes moving inter-provincially or for import or export.

First reading was given a bill to provide for elections in the Northwest Territories and to clarify the voting rights of persons engaged in public works.

Debate On Judges Bill In debate on the judges' bill, George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, opposed the increase at this time on the ground that the Government, while proclaiming an anti-inflation policy, would be setting an example in the direction of inflation.

Mr. Drew said he would not say anything that could be construed as opposing proper recognition of the great responsibility of judges. But it would be better to "let the matter stand so that we may not open the door at this time to any discussion" which might create doubt in the minds of the people.

Angus MacInnis (CCF-Vancouver East) said that before the salaries of judges are increased some thought should be done to correct conditions that brought many boys and girls into court. Better pensions should be provided for Canada's aged.

C. E. Johnston (SC-Bow River) said the increases should at least be limited to the district or county court judges. Mr. Garson would have a difficult time convincing anyone that judges receiving \$12,000 or \$13,000 a year besides a pension should be getting more.
