Inquest Held Last Night In Souris Accident

A coroner's jury at Souris last night decided that Augustus Joseph Gallant killed Monday while working with a pile driving crew on the railway wharf at Souris, came to his death accidentally. They exonerated the operator of the machine, Angus MacLean Adams from all blame.

The hearing was before coroner P. A. McLellan, Mr. S. B. Hessian of Montague represented the crew.

The text of the verdict said: "We the coroner's jury empaneled to inquire into the death of Augustus Joseph Gallant, find that the said Augustus Joseph Gallant came to his death on Monday, Oct. 13, at approximately 2:35 p. m. while under the employ of the Canadian Dredge and Dock Co. at the Dominion Government Wharf at Souris in King's County as the result of a blow caused by the sudden dropping of the leads of the pile driver being operated at the time by an employee of the Canadian Dredge and Dock Co. Ltd. That the sudden drop was caused by the unexplained release of the brake controlling the leads and it is our honest opinion that Angus MacLean Adams be exonerated from all blame."

The first witness was James Gordon MacLauchlan of Souris and formerly of Woodville, Ont. employed by the Canadian Dredge and Dock Co. Ltd. whose head office is in Toronto, Ont. They are working at the railway wharf at Souris. He has a contract for building the wharf.

MacLauchlan said he was supervisor of the works. The accident occurred on Monday about 2:35 p. m. He was not at the scene, but was some 100 feet away. He did not see it happen.

He said the machinery did not give away. The machine was working in tip top shape. The men were in the act of driving steel piles in face work. Two piles had been driven and a cross tie, a timber which goes across the two piles and carried the whaling had been lowered in place. The men had started to bolt the timber but had not finished tightening the nuts. They unhooked a chain from the timber in order to clear the machine where they were working. Three men and the foreman were working on the job.

The witness said "I heard my name called and looked down where the men were working. As I started down they pulled a man from the water onto the raft. The men were Reuben McInnis, Howard Dunphy and Lem Burke. They were working with Gallant. They worked as a gang. Lem Burke is the foreman.

"Fred Jennings called the doctor."

...while Gallant was left lying on the deck of the scow. As the doctor did not come, I called the R. C. M. P. and asked if they could locate a doctor. The doctors were out of town.

"I could not say Gallant was dead when I got there. Would say he was dead when the body was taken away."

The foreman instructed the men where to work. Lem Burke instructed Gallant where to work. Burke is employed by the Canadian Dredge and Dock Co.

"I gave instructions to the men. The foreman work under me. I instructed the men to practice safety first."

"They were instructed not to be under any load carried by the machinery. The load in this case consisted of a pile hammer weighing three and a half tons and the steel leads weighing two tons. The leads guide the hammer to the top of the driver."

The operator inspects the machinery and keeps it in first class condition. The leads drop with the brake released on the drum.

The witness said he had no idea why the brake released. It was not the fault of the men in charge. The machine was used after the accident.

MacLauchlan said he did not see the like of this accident happen before.
