# THE WAR.

Great Excitement in England.

EXTRA SUPPLIES FOR MALTA.

Russians Marching on Constantinople!

Greece Virtually Declares War against Turkey!

LONDON, Feb. 2.

Four thousand barrels of cannon powder and large quantities of torpedoes are ready for shipment to the Mediterranean fleet. Three million cartridges and a large quantity of shells were sent to Malta on Saturday.

Gladstone, in accepting addresses from the Liberal Associations at Oxford, said he considered sending the British fleet into the Dardanelles an act of war and a breach of neutrality; and that the vote of six million pounds would be taken by Turkey as an encouragement to carry on the war. He feared the vote would be carried by the failure of Irishmen to oppose it.

Foster (liberal) moved an amendment, opposing the Government vote of six million pounds. He arraigned the foreign policy, and declared that the Government were neither entitled to this, as a vote of confidence, nor was it wanted in the interests of the country.

Mr. Cross, Home Secretary, replied, and said all the Government asked was, that the demand of money be granted, which might be necessary for the requirements, and that it would be given in full confidence; that it would not be used unless absolutely necessary.

George Bright and George Trevelyan (liberals) strongly opposed the vote.

There is great excitement in England. The war feeling is rapidly increasing.

The London Times, News and other publications, with pro-Russian tendencies, have been publicly burned by members of the Stock Exchange.

Several anti-Turk meetings have been turned into anti-Russian, and caused a great deal of disturbance.

The German Gazette says that there is a scheme in discussion to hold Constantinople by land while the squadron are stationed before the sea front.

A Berlin correspondent of the Standard learns that France has confidently declared that she stands on the same side as Germany with regard to the Eastern Question, although resolved to avoid foreign complications.

The Russians are within twenty-four hours march of Constantinople.

The Porte has decided to defend the city. There is great enthusiasm for war in Greece.

The whole population is summoned to be enrolled in the National guard.

The Boston steamer Metropolis, from Philadelphia for Brazil with two hundred and forty-eight passengers on board, principally railroad laborers, is ashore at Carriak beach. There were one hundred and sixty passengers drowned.

The Russians have reached Teherkesoi, and are marching on Rodosto and Kishan with an army of ten thousand strong.

Robert Pasha, with the Turkish fleet, arrived at Constantinople, bringing ten battalions of troops from Batoum.

Greece has virtually declared war against Turkey.

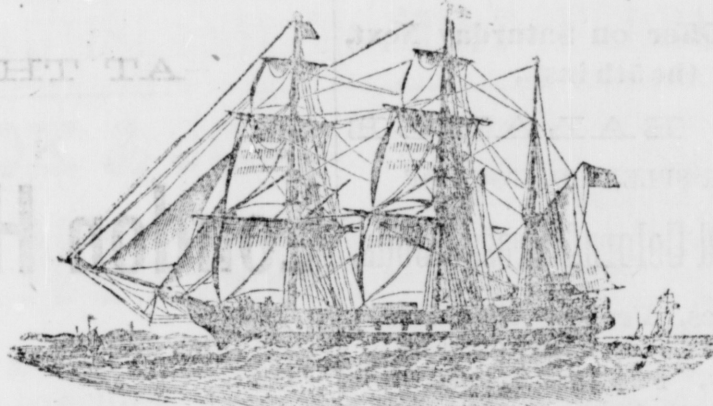
