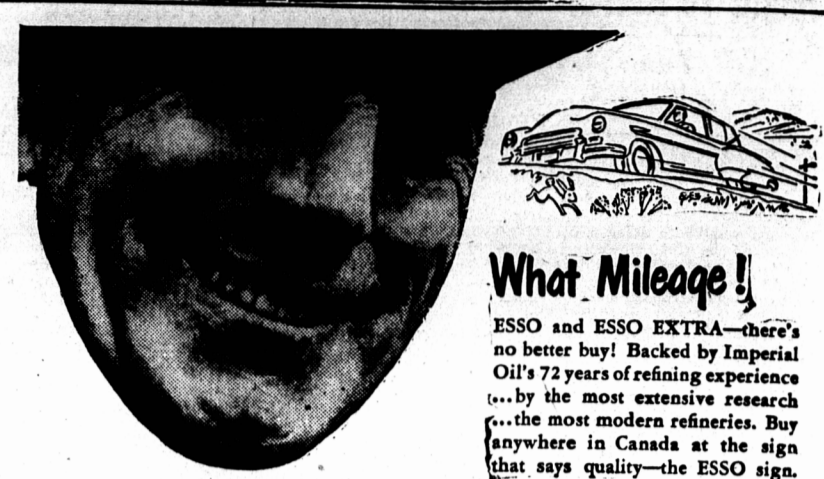
Mr. Richard Gauthier has returned to Rustico after spending several months in Lorne Valley where he was employed.
