

Local and Other Items.

NEW SPRING HATS.—For Spring Styles in Ladies' Hats go to J. B. McDonald's.

The mails crossed to this side, and will arrive in this city at 6 o'clock this evening.

The "Northern Light" left Pictou this morning, but her arrival at Georgetown has not yet been reported.

By cable to Lengworth & Co., the bark "Ringwood," Trainor, master, arrived in Oporto, on the 10th—27 days from Philadelphia.

A SPECIAL meeting of the City Council will be held this evening at 7.30 p. m. Councillor Davy will introduce a By-Law to tax personal property.

Report of the St. Lawrence Marine Insurance Co.'s Meeting, the B. I. Society Meeting, and other matter crowded out, will appear to-morrow.

CARLYLE'S health, which has been considered precarious for many months, is now fully restored, and he is busily engaged in his literary labors. His work at present in hand is the preparation of his autobiography, which will be completed during the coming summer.

THE New York Daily Witness announces its suspension at the close of last month, on account of the advance in paper and the failure of good people to support it. It is only the truly good papers, like THE EXAMINER, that can stand the strain of life's battles.

A GRAND distance skating match of one-and-a-half hours duration, will take place in the Citizen's Skating Rink to-morrow (Friday) evening, starting at eight o'clock. Three prizes are offered. But four entries have been made, viz: Messrs. D. O'M. Reddin, James Fraser, John A. Moore, and Thomas DesBrisay. A good match is expected, as it is anticipated that six other entries will be made, and ten will start in the race to-morrow evening.

SAINT PAUL'S CHURCH ASSOCIATION.—The subject of the last lecture, viz., "The degree of Ritual allowed in the Church of England as by law established," produced, as was quite natural, a sharp discussion, occupying two evenings. Lieut. Dixon's paper was very carefully prepared, and his authorities and position almost impregnable. The ten minutes limited to each speaker in debate, is no doubt too short, and to economize time it has been deemed preferable by some to put their arguments in writing, which is quite allowable. Besides, this greatly facilitates the duties of the Chairman in confining the remarks closely to the subject, no easy matter at times. The regular meeting announced for last Friday evening was postponed by reason of the severe storm, to next Friday evening, the 12th inst. Dr. Read's subject is "Baptism, as taught in the Bible and Prayer Book." This ordinance, the 1st of the two Sacraments of the Church of England, not instituted by the Church, but because it was ordained by Christ himself in His last grand commission to the Apostles, wherein they were commanded to make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the blessed Trinity. And, if the kingdom of God on this earth, is identical with the Christian Church, how desirable it is that this rite of naturalization into this kingdom, should be highly prized by all who value their spiritual inheritance. Meeting opens at 8 o'clock, p. m. Chairman, John Inga, Esq. Entrance free. Discussion open to all members.

It is reported that the members for the city, Messrs. DeBlois and McLeod, held a meeting in the Law Library last evening for the purpose of getting an expression of opinion about the tax which it is reported is soon to be imposed by the Government on the citizens of Charlottetown. Owen Connelly, Esq., occupied the chair. Mr. McLeod said it was his desire to make known the intention of the Country members on the subject of Town Taxation and to ask his friends if they were prepared to allow themselves to be taxed as the country districts are taxed. He thought it was unfair to tax the city, inasmuch as the city had its own Government, and taxes itself for its own local improvements. Mr. DeBlois contended that it was wrong to admit the principle of city taxation by the Local Government, and said, in justice, the city was entitled to one tenth of the \$300,000 given to this Province by the Dominion Government. He would not be a party to the admission of the principle. Several prominent persons addressed the meeting, declaring, in unmistakable terms, their opposition to taxation by the Local Government. A committee of eight gentlemen were appointed to wait upon the Leader of the Government to know what he intended to do in the matter. The committee had an interview with the Government to-day. The Premier, we learn, promised to give the committee information as soon as he could do so.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT!

Politics in England.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OATAWA, March 10.
Sir Richard Cartwright's attack upon the Government's financial policy was chiefly an attack upon the sugar and the coal duties imposed under the tariff of 1879. He assumed to be the champion of the poor man, because these two duties had, he alleged, increased the cost of living.

Mackenzie, last evening, spoke for a short time, complaining of Tupper's abusive style; but the general feeling is that Cartwright richly deserved the terrible castigation he received from Tupper, because of his malicious and uncalled for sneers at Sir Leonard Tilley. As Tupper proceeded the House greeted him with round after round of applause. Mackenzie had the floor when the House adjourned. The debate shall be resumed.

The House met to-day at 3.25. After the usual routine proceedings regarding petitions, the first report of the Committee of Public Accounts was presented. The Committee recommended that all expenditures of every kind be subjected to the audit of the Auditor-General.

In answer to Mr. Farrow, Sir Leonard said no negotiations had been opened with Newfoundland, for the free admission of cattle into that Province.

Mr. Brecken asked for surveys and Engineers' reports respecting the connecting of Cape Portmentine with the Intercolonial Railway, and the connecting of Cape Traverse with the Island Railway. He showed how necessary these branches were to the people of P. E. Island.

McIsaac, Hackett, Yeo and Sir Albert Smyth continued the debate.

Sir Chas. Tupper said it was not practicable to maintain mail communication between the Island and the mainland, except at the Capes. The order has been given to the "Northern Light" to proceed to the Capes, and see how far steam communication can be kept up at these points. In the meantime the question of the railway remain in abeyance. He argued in favor of the railway. McDonald (King's, P. E. I.) spoke favorably of the "Northern Light," and hoped she would be continued in her present route.

Burpee (Sunbury) asked for correspondence respecting the claims made by the Government of New Brunswick and the Dominion Government since 1st of March, 1879.

LONDON, March 10.
W. E. Foster, Liberal leader in the Commons, has issued an address to the electors of Bradford, in reply to Beaconsfield's manifesto.

He denies the charge that the political opponents of the Premier seek to disintegrate the United Kingdom, and he intimates that it is made in the hope of diverting attention from the mischievous Foreign and Indian Policy of the Government. He agrees with Beaconsfield that the strength of the nation depends upon unity of feeling; but he believes the power of England can only be upheld by a wiser Foreign and Colonial Policy, and a Home Policy which will increase the public welfare.

Mr. Shaw, the Home Rule leader, in his address to the electors of Cork, characterized Beaconsfield's letter as an electioneering manifesto, placing false issues before the people and tending to excite the worst passions of the ignorant. He says, "I call on the Irish people to answer the insulting mission of the Prime Minister by returning an overwhelming majority at the coming election, pledged to the settlement of the great vital national question, pledged to give ample facilities for the creation of a peasant proprietary, wherever possible to restore, define and legalize tenant right in Ulster, and extend it to the whole of the country."

The London Stock Exchange showed the effect of the approaching dissolution of Parliament yesterday, in the sharp decline of Consols, and mostly home securities, on the theory that the general election means an increased demand for money.
