

(Continued from page 10) by convinced that the introduction of fish-ladders increases the general trout population by allowing fish access to spawning beds at the upper reaches of many ponds.

The upper reaches of Sherry's Creek flows through the back portion of the old homestead. Last November I was puzzled at the scarcity of spawning trout on the time honoured beds that were in operation as I was a bare foot lad. One "bed" didn't hold over a dozen trout and none of them were overly large and furthermore they had all the earmarks of local fish. In my own mind the mystery was solved last December. I was told that a party of anglers from Charlottetown had constructed a barrier across Sherry's Creek between Sherry's bridge and Murnaghan's bridge.

My informant told me that the trout were slaughtered there all through November. To prevent any trout from leaping the barrier they strung wire mesh across the back of the spillway even though it was a good three feet above the pool. I wondered where some of our City anglers were getting the big catches at Sherry's last September during the two weeks extension period. Pictures of some even made the front page in our local press. I passed this information on to our Fisheries Department and a Fisheries Officer was dispatched to the scene. He came back reported "all clear".

He must have been allergic to walking through alders for it was there I made it a point this spring to go and check it for myself.

The obstruction represented a lot of labour. It was constructed mainly of stone and no ordinary trout would be able to leap the spillway. Not a trout got past last fall for any trout strong enough to reach the spillway platform found its way barred by wire mesh. I found that the unusually heavy freshet this spring that washed out so many dams also done our trout a good turn and cut a wing off the obstruction. Such an obstruction is definitely contrary to the Federal Fisheries Act and a heavy penalty imposed for such an infraction. Next time I'll not have anything myself and testify in Court, if necessary, if my findings warrant same. A lot of our present day trout fishermen are such in name only. They never have a catch worthwhile showing and bragging about unless the trout are all sewed up solid not even a fishing chance for survival.
