12 Islanders Plan To Take Part In Educational Meet

The Canadian Conference on Education, which will be held in Ottawa February 16-20, will bring more than 700 delegates of labor, business, educational and professional organizations to the capital for study of the problems facing Canada's educational system.

Those attending from this province will include: G. R. MacNutt, Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, Rev. Eric Robin, K. A. Parker, Squadron Leader Murray Shanks, all from the Home and School and Parent-Teachers Association; Miss Mable Matheson, President John Hughes, and Dr. Frank MacKinnon from the P.E.I. Teachers Federation; Wilson Ross, Canadian Association of School Superintendents and Inspectors; Malcolm MacKenzie, Canadian Education Association; Alex MacLean, Charlottetown District Labor Council; and E. D. Reid, Boards of Trade.

The 700 delegates, representing more than two million Canadians, will hear not only outstanding Canadians but some of the world's leading figures in education. An international panel on the opening day will bring together speakers from Great Britain, the United States, the U.S.S.R., and Canada in a discussion of national philosophies of education.

The Conference, the most extensive and significant attack ever made on Canada's educational problems, is being sponsored by 19 national organizations who have been joined by more than 70 participating groups. Delegates will come from every corner of Canada and represent every facet of Canadian life.

Of three major opening-day addresses, the first will be by Dr. Wilder Penfield, world-famous Montreal neurosurgeon who is chairman of the Conference. Douglas Le Pan of Ottawa, closely identified with the Gordon Commission on Canada's economic prospects, will discuss the question of how much education Canada can afford. The third major address is by Dr. Marcel Faribault, Montreal financier and former secretary of the University of Montreal.

On the fourth and last full day of the Conference, the deliberations and findings of the delegates will be given a friendly but searching appraisal by Sir Ronald Gould, who as president of the World Confederation on education.

Perhaps the most productive part of the Conference program is the eight "workshops" whose sessions will take up the second and third days. At these sessions eight specific spheres of education, ranging from the quantity and quality of teachers to the use of leisure time, will be subjected to exhaustive and examination by leading authorities.

AGRICULTURAL NEWS

P.E.I. Department of Agriculture

LICE CONTROL ON CATTLE

During the fall and winter months, farmers are faced with the problem of controlling cattle lice. First of all let us discuss the different kinds of lice which affect cattle. There are two kinds of sucking lice, the short nosed louse, and the long nosed louse; and one kind of biting louse. The sucking lice, as the name implies, pierce the skin and suck blood. The biting louse on the other hand feeds on dead tissue. Both types of lice irritate the animal.

Does this irritation reflect in any economic loss? The amount of money lost through these parasites cannot be estimated, since it is not known exactly how much loss in milk flow lousiness cows, nor exactly how much extra feed is required to fatten a lousy steer of heifer. Nevertheless it is generally accepted that louse infestation lowers Milk Production and retard gains in both dairy and beef cattle.

Do cattle lice effect any other species of animals?

HOST SPECIFIC

Cattle lice are host specific; that is, they are seldom able to live for more than a few days on another animal. The entire life of the cattle louse is spent on the body of the cow. They will transfer from one animal to another, especially in crowded quarters. This is done generally by contact.

How would a louse infestation be spotted?

It is not usually difficult to spot. Loose hair and bare patches of skin would indicate a biting louse infestation. In the case of sucking lice, an infestation may be readily spotted by dark patches on the brisket, udder and tail head areas. These dark patches ranging in diameter from 1/4 to 2 or more inches, are colonies of lice.

This brings us to the next question—

CONTROL METHODS

Veterinarians and Entomologists have made much progress in louse control methods with the new chemicals, in the past decade. Before this rotenone was the chief insecticide used. The present recommendation for louse control is, wash, dip, spray or dust with D.D.T., methoxychlor, toxaphene, rotenone, pyrethron or lindane. Using wettable powders, emulsible concentrates, or dusts as recommended by the manufacturer. Animals should be treated twice, 12 to 14 days apart.

Only rotenone, pyrethron and methoxychlor are permissible for use on dairy cattle. Lindane and D.D.T. should not be used on animals within one month of slaughter. Effectiveness of control is directly dependent on the complete coverage of the infested animal.

E. KINGS DIRECTORS

The President, Major Reid, of the Eastern Kings Artificial Breeding Club, met with the Directors last Thursday in the Town Hall Souris. Others in attendance were Albert Mills Inseminator for the Club and Dr. George C. Fisher who heads the Artificial Breeding Programme for the Province.

It was noted that the increase in the number of cattle bred during 1957 was substantial over the previous year. Some of the problems were that breeders were not placing their calf for service the day called, before ten in the morning. It was also pointed out that if this cooperation was received that much more efficient service could be rendered to the members and better results obtained.

Dr. Fisher stated that the percentage of non returns was approximately 70 percent. This he stated was very satisfactory and a reflection on the good job being performed by the Inseminator.

RESIGNATION

Albert Mills, the Inseminator, reviewed the work for the last few months. He stated that the work was interesting and steadily increasing. Mr. Mills went on to say he feels that there is a good future for the Club. However, due to personal reasons he has found it necessary to tender his resignation. He expressed his thanks to the Directors and members of the Club for their co-operation. The resignation will become effective when a suitable replacement is selected and trained.
