Farm Income Report Results In Comment

Commenting yesterday on recent Dominion Bureau of Statistics figures which showed that Prince Edward Island farm income was down \$3,567,000 in the first nine months of 1961 as compared to the same period in 1960, Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said, "I can't see how that much money could be taken out of the economy and not be felt to a great degree."

According to the bureau, the low price of potatoes was to blame for the loss in farm income. The figures showed that farm cash income in the province for the first nine months of 1961 was \$18,214,000 as compared to \$21,781,000 for the same period in 1960.

Growing Of Grain Believed Solution

"If we are to achieve more success in our livestock and poultry industries, we should have a ceiling on the cost of imported feed grains, and if this is not possible, we should grow more feed grains here," Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said yesterday.

According to Mr. MacRae, this was the general feeling of Maritime Provinces' ministers of agriculture who met in Moncton last weekend to discuss freight assistance on water borne grains.

Mr. MacRae said that the ministers reviewed a brief, drawn up by the Maritime Provinces' Federation of Agriculture, which will be presented to a committee appointed to inquire into the present rates of

assistance on western feed grains shipped to the Maritimes. "I am convinced that we must grow more grain here," said Mr. MacRae. "This can be done by using more and better fertilizer on grain crops; by renting additional land; and by diverting land to grain production, preferably potato-growing land."

Island Native Dies In Mass.

SUMMERSIDE — A native of Prince Edward Island, William J. Smith passed away at his home in Arlington, Mass., yesterday morning in his 92nd year. Word was received in Summerside yesterday by his brother, Hugh D. Smith, Cedar Avenue.

The late Mr. Smith entered Symmes Hospital, Arlington on Dec. 28 after being in failing health for several months. He was born in Freehold more than 70 years ago, and established a highly successful jewellery business in Boston. He had an office in the Jewellers Building, Washington Street, Boston until his retirement four years ago.

He was an annual visitor to the island where he spent his summer vacations, missing only three summers in more than 70 years.

He is survived by his wife the former Blanche Celley, Milford, Mass.; three brothers, Arthur, Freehold; Hugh D., Summerside and Patterson, Port Huron, Mich.; and two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Sims, Brookline, Mass. and Mrs. L.A. MacGregor, Milford, Mass.

A brother, Caleb passed away in California in 1957. He was a long standing member of the Shriners, having belonged to the Masonic Order for more than 60 years. He received a signal honor from that organization after 50 years of faithful and dedicated membership.

Funeral arrangements were not completed last evening.

PILOT COMPLETES SURVIVAL COURSE
Flying Officer Roger I. Clark, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Clark, Mount Stewart, P.E.I., recently graduated from the RCAF's Survival Training School at Naino, Alta.

The course is designed to teach air force fliers how to care for themselves in the event of a forced or crash landing in the wilderness.

Each air crew member of the service is expected to receive the rugged training which is in three phases, summer, winter and arctic survival. During the three-week summer or winter bush courses, the fliers live in emergency rations and stay in brush lean-tos or parachute tents in the Rocky Mountain foothills. The Arctic phase is conducted at Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island, N.W.T. For seven days during this phase the survival students build and live in igloos and have the opportunity of catching and eating Arctic char.

N.B. Schoolboys Are Endeard To British Fans
FREDERICTON (CP) — The Gleaner says a party of 25 New Brunswick high school English rugby players touring the north of England have earned the respect of English players and fans alike for their sportsmanship and enthusiasm for the game.

The paper says in a "newspace" London dispatch the Canadian boys have "endeard" themselves to fans by their determination to beat the blizzards and frozen grounds that have interfered with much of their schedule.

In three games played so far all on frost-bitten, blizzard-swept or snow-covered pitches—the New Brunswick youngsters lost 22-7 to Castleford Juniors, 24-8 to Stanningley and 25-11 to Leeds. The prospect of yet another snow-covered field faces them today (Wednesday) when they meet the Royal Army Pay Corps at Halifax.

The tour was organized by Frank Muggleston, coach of New Brunswick Interscholastic Rugby League champion Saint John High School. The tour, at cost of \$6,500, was financed partly by the boys themselves and partly by public subscription.

The Gleaner also says: Bill Thorpe, Fredericton High School physical education teacher travelling with the team, has expressed amazement at the attitude of the Nova Brunswick Interscholastic Athletic Association which criticized the tour at its annual meeting Friday.

Mr. Thorpe said Tuesday "I cannot understand the attitude of the NBIAA. There was no previous inkling of the stand of the Fredericton representative."

J.B. Harris, Fredericton NBIAA representative, criticized the method of raising money for the tour as "a bit of beggary."

Actress Gets Jewelry Back
NEW YORK (AP) — Less than 24 hours after she reported to police the disappearance of \$10,000 worth of jewelry, actress Shelley Winters got a plain white envelope by special delivery mail.

Inside the envelope she found the \$5,000 matching diamond necklace and earrings; the \$3,700 diamond pendant and the three wrist watches worth \$1,300 which she had told police were stolen.

Miss Winters said the jewelry disappeared from a dresser drawer in her Central Park West apartment between Friday and Saturday nights and she had no idea whether it was taken by a thief with a sense of humor or a friend with a heavy-handed sense of humor.

"I got the jewelry back," she said, "and that's all I care about."

Iraq Planning Bigger Oil Cut
LONDON (AP) — Iraq's oil minister said Tuesday his country intends to take a bigger cut of the profits in the giant Iraq Petroleum Corporation.

Minister Mohammad Salmas also told a press conference Iraq intends to force IPC to sell one fifth of its stock holdings to the Baghdad government.

The two moves were among the most important of 12 demands by Iraq which IPC rejected in prolonged talks. The negotiations broke down Oct. 13.

IPC is owned by American, British, Dutch and French interests.
