NOT A BREAK DOWN.

The Patriot declares that THE EXAMINER has made a break down in its defence of the Senate's rejection of the bill granting \$300,000 to the Manitoba Government out of the school funds of the Province.

The Manitoba School Fund, held in trust by the Government of Canada, now amounts, it is said, to about \$500,000. At three per cent interest, this capital sum is now yielding \$15,000 a year.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

Meeting of the Synod of Nova Scotia.

THE COLLEGIATE AND COLLEGE SCHOOLS AT WINDSOR.

At the opening of the bi-ennial session of the Synod on Friday last there were present 83 clerical delegates and 60 lay delegates. The Rev. W. J. Ancient was re-elected Clerical Secretary, and the Rev. W. Charles Wilson was elected Assistant Clerical Secretary.

King's College presents much the same characteristics as those of recent years.
