THE OPPOSITION AND THE RAILWAYS.

(Summerside Journal.)

The Liberals have always shown themselves opposed to railway extension, unless, perhaps, in Quebec, where Parnell and his clique could make "a good thing of it." They opposed, tooth and nail, the Canadian Pacific Railway, which has done so much to make Canada the great country and the centre in the eyes of the world. Before that they opposed the building of the Intercolonial, which has linked the provinces together, and done more than anything else to make them one. And particularly have they opposed the building of branches in Prince Edward Island. Hon. Edward Blake did his best against railway extension in this province, when in Parliament in 1870 he labored to show that so far as the Island was concerned there was a deficit of over a million dollars; Hon. Mr. Mackenzie opposed it when in 1882 he fought against the Cape Traverse branch, saying: "I think we have done very well by the Island, and have carried out the terms of union to the utmost possible extent." Sir Richard Cartwright opposed it in Parliament and on the stump, time and again, notably at Ingersoll in 1888. Mr. I. H. Davies opposed it in Parliament in 1895, when he characterized the proposition to build branch railways as a farce, and the parliamentary followers of these leaders, from far and near, have re-echoed their sentiments. Let the electors remember, when they cast their ballots on June 23rd next, that it is the Liberals they have to thank for there being no appropriation this year for branch railways in Prince Edward Island.

LATEST NEWS NOTES.

The derelives along the Nile are unusually inactive. The Queen is expected to arrive at Windsor to-morrow or next day. It seems difficult for the Marquis of Queensberry to keep out of the police courts. He has just been fined fifteen shillings for riding his bicycle on the sidewalk. Queen Victoria is going to confer the Order of the Garter on the Crown Prince of Denmark and the Grand Cross of the Bath on his brother, Prince Charles, who is to marry Princess Maud of Wales. A queer pig story is told by the London Telegraph. A sow that lost her tail by accident had a litter of ten little pigs, but seeing that they all had tails, placed them in a row and bit off the tails one by one. Ten thousand people visited the South Kensington and Beaulieu Museums in London on the first Sunday on which they were thrown open. Only ten attendants and thirty-four policemen had to work on Sunday. The Dominion Bank statement for March shows a marked increase in circulation, deposits and loans as compared with the corresponding month of last year. The increase in the circulation is larger by a million and a quarter, while the current accounts are over twelve millions and public deposits over two millions greater. Bradstreet says: The retail trade is fair in Montreal, Ottawa and Kingston, but general trade throughout the province of Quebec is less active owing to the damage by floods and the consequent bad roads. In some instances travellers have been recalled. Toronto jobbers report business fair, and at Halifax there is an improvement in the movement of merchandise with better country roads and opening of ports to navigation. The latter influence is also having a favorable effect on business in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. There are 37 failures in business reported from the Dominion of Canada, against 34 last week, 32 one year ago, 20 two years ago and 35 three years ago.
