### Cornwall Is Cited As Example Of Community Co-operation

CORNWALL, Ont. (CP)—This seaway city is a heartening example of how community co-operation can overcome economic setbacks. The solution, to go out and attract new industries, sounds deceptively simple. This year Cornwall has added four manufacturing firms, small ones but capable of rapid expansion. As well, two major industries long established here are making sizeable expansions.

Officials of the city industrial commission say it has been one of the most successful years for some time in new industrial growth. This has meant a good deal to this city of 43,500 population in the inevitable let-down after com-

pletion of the huge St. Lawrence hydro - electric project nearby. The newest blow is the eventual shutdown of the Canadian Cottons Limited mills here, involving the jobs of 1,200 employees. OPTIMISM BUOYED But civic optimism has been buoyed by the success of vigorous efforts to make up the loss. A turning point came when E. D. May took over early in the year as industrial commissioner. One of his first acts was to promote establishment of the Cornwall Industrial Development Company, with public subscriptions, to supply sites and buildings for new small industries. The company took over an industrial site formerly owned by

the Ontario Hydro Commission in the city's west end. With the assistance of the industrial commission under Alderman J. D. Murray, Mr. May interested four new small industries in establishing on the property.

Now there is a proposal that the development company take over the Canadian Cottons Company buildings for later resale to other new firms. Alderman Murray said in an interview it would be a serious mistake not to acquire the mill building. But he denied a recent report quoting him as saying the city faces economic disaster if it doesn't act immediately to overcome unemployment.

"We're not in bad shape at all," he said. Mayor L. G. Lavignes said the city has problems "but problems which can and will be overcome."
