

Local Railwaymen Propose Revision Of Legislation

Amendments to various Island statutes as proposed in a memorandum presented to the Provincial Government last August by the International Railway Brotherhoods local organizations, were discussed yesterday at a joint meeting of the Executive Council and the local committee members.

Representing the Brotherhoods were J. C. Carroll, chairman, Maintenance of Way Employees; E. P. Lynde, secretary, Railway Trainmen; E. P. Doyle, representing the Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen; J. G. Burge, vice-chairman, order of Railroad Telegraphers; and A. E. Murphy, representing the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Premier A. W. Matheson observed that the afternoon had been spent very profitably.

"The local Brotherhood is doing an excellent job in pointing out various things necessary for the well-being of the community in

which they live", Hon. Mr. Matheson said.

GAS TAX

With regard to the Gasoline Tax Act, the committee pointed out that during the past 15 years, highway costs have increased by approximately 140 per cent, and maintenance and administrative costs have risen close to 100 per cent.

Since the gasoline tax revenues constitute the largest source of highway revenue, a close relationship should exist between the trend in highway costs and the gas tax, but this has not been the case. The tax lags far behind having been increased 60 per cent since 1940.

The brief outlined further that there has been a striking increase in diesel powered vehicle use of the highways.

Since such vehicles use 50 to 60 per cent less fuel than gasoline powered vehicles, the brief recommended that the tax on diesel

fuel used by motor driven vehicles using the highway be increased 50 per cent over the rate of tax applied to gasoline.

CHANGES SOUGHT

In its consideration of the Workmen's Compensation Act, the compensation by aggravation of disease by injury, and also a shorter waiting period.

Further medical aid and rehabilitation were discussed, as also an increased scale of compensation.

Among other topics discussed were agriculture, elimination and protection of level crossings, allowances for disabled persons, coordination of rehabilitation services, the older wage earner.

The brief proposed that free hospital, medical and dental care be granted to those receiving Old Age Assistance, and that a widow or unmarried woman between the ages of 60 and 65 who is in needy circumstances receive a pension of \$55.00.

It was also suggested that the Mothers' Allowance Act be further extended.

With regard to the Judicature Act with reference to ex parte injunctions, the committee considered they should be abolished in labour disputes or not used until the person affected receive prior notice.

OTHER AMENDMENTS

Amendments were also proposed regarding the Labour Relations Act, Housing, Minimum Wage Act, Jury Duty, Provincial Industrial Development, Welfare Bureau, Public Health, Education and the Highway Traffic Act.

The committee emphasized the value of direct representation of labour on various bodies in the study and administration of measures of vital concern to the large number of citizens who are wage earners, and offered their co-operation and the co-operation of those whom they represented in all matters.

LONDON (Reuters) - Britain today made a new move toward reviving a proposed round-table conference on Cyprus' future.

Prime Minister Macmillan told the House of Commons that confidential discussions on Cyprus will take place during the NATO conference of foreign and defence ministers in Paris next week.

"I feel sure that this approach is the most likely to be fruitful," he said.

The prime minister spoke five days after the United Nations General Assembly urged Britain, Greece and Turkey to seek a just settlement of their dispute over the island colony.

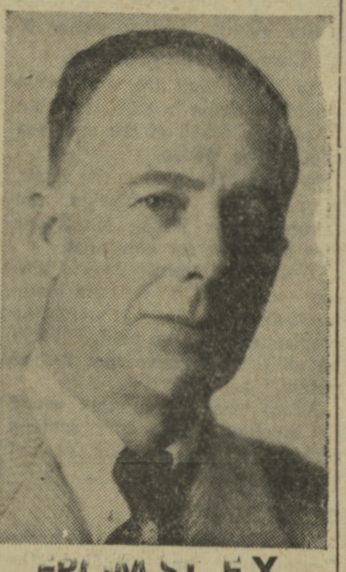

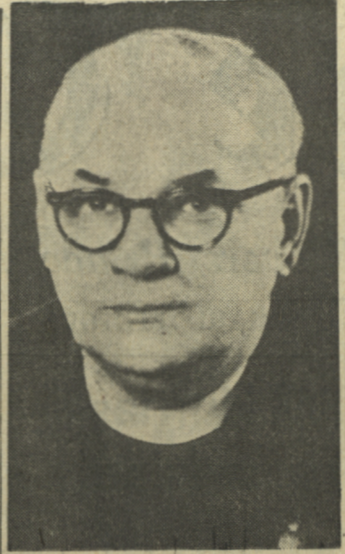


RT. REV. R. H. WATERMAN
