

Runaway Stars Speed At Near Incredible Velocity

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Some great star clusters in the far distant reaches of space are rushing on into outer space at a speed of 75,000 miles a second, according to astronomers from Mt. Wilson and Palomar observatories reported Sunday.

This almost incredible velocity, 40 per cent of the speed of light, is faster by far than the movement of debris in the blast of an atom bomb and it involves countless numbers of stars and other bodies of astronomical size.

The calculations involved suggest, the astronomer said, an indefinitely expanding universe or something not far from it. The report was made to the American Astronomical Society by Dr. W. A. Baum, who used the great 200-inch Palomar telescope and some additional new equipment to obtain the results.

NO END TO SPEEDUP

Dr. Baum's work further strengthens the theory that the universe is ballooning outward with an ever-increasing speed, with no sign that this progressive increase ever will stop. At every turn so far astronomers have found that the farther away stars are, the faster they are going.

Dr. Baum found these results in observing a cluster of galaxies known as cluster 1448. Figuring this cluster increases its speed by 30 miles a second for every million light years of its travel, it is now 1.3 billion light years away, he said. A light year is the distance travelled by a ray of light in one year—about six million million miles.

The results could be interpreted, Dr. Baum said, as indicating that the outward speed will continue to increase but perhaps not so much as it has up to now.

TIMELY NOTES ON FUR TOPICS

Exports of undressed Japanese mink skins to the United States in June from Japan were 25,000, making a total of 280,000 for the first half of 1956. This gives evidence that Japan is steadily increasing its production of mink.

Another report reaching the New York market is that an additional 300 to 500 thousand Russian squirrel skins have been purchased by American buyers in Leningrad in private deals following the recent auctions there.

NOISE MUTATION

A despatch from Oslo, Norway, to Women's Weekly, N.Y., has the following, which will be very interesting to our mink and fox ranchers throughout the Maritimes:—The new Norwegian mink crop, which will begin selling at auction in December, will include a minimum increase of 15 per cent over the 180,000 mutation skins produced last season. Ivar Thome, director, Oslo Skinnauktioner, told Fairchild News Service here. Production of standard mink will remain approximately unchanged at 200,000 skins. This will mark the first season in which any Scandinavian country has offered more mutation than standard mink, according to Mr. Thome. The mutation increases will be in all types with the largest gain in pastels, he said. There will also be a good increase in sapphire production. Mr. Thome expects to see more pale brown types, such as topaze, as well.

Production of Norwegian blue fox is being cut from 600 skins in 1955-1956 to 40,000 for the coming season. When the auction season ended in April the Oslo auction house had some unsold stocks but these have been largely cleared during the last three to four months, Mr. Thome explained. Medium pale skins have been completely sold. The United States was the largest buyer during the post-auction activity, he added. He estimated that of the almost 60,000 skins disposed of last season, about two-thirds went to American buyers.

"We started to promote Norwegian blue fox in the United States about three years ago," Mr. Thome said. "For the first year and a half both demand and prices rose until they reached a peak about 18 months ago. Then a downward readjustment of prices set in until now I believe they have reached what is considered a reasonable level." Mr. Thome said that from reports he has received, there are indications that all the other Scandinavian countries will have some increases in their mink crops this season.

"However, whereas we in Norway are concentrating our increased output in mutations, I would not be surprised if the other Scandinavian countries registered their expansion in standard mink as well," he added. "Everywhere in Scandinavia there have also been considerable efforts expanded by farmers to improve the quality of the crops and I believe progress will be noted in all markets during the coming season." Mr. Thome said American attendance at the Scandinavian fur auctions was at an all-time peak last year and he expects the United States interest to continue. He said the Scandinavian countries will continue their promotion of "SAGA" mink in Europe. He noted considerable success during the first year of the promotion, during the past year and cited the number of Scandinavian minks shown in the recent collections in Paris and Florence.

Five to 15 per cent increase in retail fur sales has been noted by department store buyers in mid-western United States, department stores did not attribute their increases completely to promotional activity but felt that the general business trend is good. Though buyers interviewed are trying to promote beaver, persian lamb and

a variety of other furs in jackets and full-length coats, mink stoles are leading sales by a wide margin. One buyer explained the popularity of the mink stole by stating, "customers request stoles when buying furs because they're so versatile, adaptable to daytime, evening or formal wear, and no fur lends itself so beautifully to the lines of a stole as does mink."

Pamphlet Is Critical Of Quebec Voting

MONTREAL (CP)—The public morality committee of Montreal's Civic Action League has printed for public sale 100,000 copies of an article, attacking Quebec electoral methods, by two priests on the staff of Laval University.

The article by Abbes Gerard Dion and Louis O'Neill, originally intended for restricted circulation among members of the Roman Catholic clergy, aroused wide comment after its publication by newspapers three weeks ago.

It appeared Saturday in English and French in brochure form and reprinted with it were editorials from a number of Canadian newspapers commenting on the article.

The 48-page pamphlet also announced formation of a provincial council of public morality. Establishment of such a group was recommended in the article by the two Laval University professors as a means of raising the level of electoral methods in Quebec.

The Civic Action League is a municipal reform group which backed Mayor Jean Drapeau's election at the head of a clean-up administration two years ago.

The pamphlet said the provincial council of public morality will encourage the formation of local groups in all the cities and towns in the province.

One large department store conducted a \$588 mink stole promotion which, according to the buyer, resulted in the sale of several much higher priced stoles as well as the advertised merchandise. EMBA minks in Argenta, Autumn Haze and Cerulean were most successful in this promotion. With the arrival of cold weather, several buyers hope for a strengthening in jacket and full-length coat sales. At the present time the mink jacket with a true sleeve is number two in sales. They buyer in a large department store admitted that mink has made up to two-thirds of his fur sales so far during the summer promotions. In both departments and fur stores, the most popular price bracket in minks ranges from \$500 to \$750.

Fee-Splitting Is Illegal Though Not In Criminal Code

TORONTO (CP) — Fee-splitting is illegal and a hospital is justified in punishing staff doctors who engage in it, a justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario has ruled.

Mr. Justice A. M. Label described the practice, by which a consulting specialist pays part of his fees to the patient's referring physician, as a breaking of trust with the patient.

In his judgment Thursday he dismissed the attempt of three London, Ont., doctors to have Victoria Hospital's anti-fee-splitting by-law declared invalid.

Drs. Harold Henderson, J. H. Spence and Donald B. Ferguson said in their appeal last March they objected principally to the bylaw which enabled the hospital to have a staff doctor's books audited and gave the board of trustees power to deny a doctor privileges of the hospital.

Mr. Justice Label said a patient is entitled to assume the doctor who recommends an operation has no pecuniary interest in the operation.

"If the medical adviser has a pecuniary interest — and a fee-splitting arrangement is such an interest — he must disclose it or fall in the discharge of his duty to his patient, and by failing in that way he acts illegally in my opinion."

He said the practice is not forbidden by the Criminal Code of Canada, but is illegal nonetheless.
