DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Religious Denominations in Canada.

The Census Returns.

OTTAWA, May 19. In the House of Commons yesterday it was agreed that Parliament should adjourn from Friday until the following Wednesday.

The census bulletin number 9, dealing with the religions of the people, was issued to-day. The total increase of the population accounted for in the statement of religious denominations is 475,701. Of this increase, 198,458 was among Roman Catholics; 104,488 Methodists; 79,034 Presbyterians; 66,092 Church of England; 17,629 Lutherans; 7,224 Baptists; and 2,151 others.

The returns from Ontario show that the Methodists have grown most with the Roman Catholics, Presbyterians and Episcopalians in the order named. The Catholic Church has increased by 121,251. In Quebec the Episcopal Church has increased by 6,118, Presbyterians by 2,314, and Methodists by 417.

The Presbyterians have lost in the eastern provinces, to gain in Manitoba. The percentage of religions are Roman Catholics, 43.17; Methodists, 17.90; Presbyterians, 14.98; Episcopal, 13; Baptists, 6.42; others, 4.64.

In Prince Edward Island the principal changes are: Roman Catholics increased 722, Methodists increased 111, Salvation Army increased 180, other denominations increased 481; Church of England decreased 5,501, Presbyterians decreased 703. Presbyterians have increased most in Manitoba, with the Methodists, Episcopalians, Roman Catholics and Baptists in the order named, while in British Columbia the Episcopal Church has the lead. The Methodists have made the greatest proportional increase, with Presbyterians, Church of England and Roman Catholics in the order named.

The Episcopal Church has decreased in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, but has remarkably increased in British Columbia.

Professor Schurman Unanimously Elected President of Cornell University.

ITHACA, N. Y., May 19. Professor J. G. Schurman was yesterday forenoon unanimously elected President of Cornell University.

One Man One Vote.

LONDON, May 19. In the House of Commons yesterday, Hon. George Shaw Lefevre (Liberal) moved the second reading of the bill providing for the abolition of plural voting.

Mr. Russell (Liberal) moved an amendment declaring it inexpedient to carry out the one man vote principle until the number of representatives in Great Britain and Ireland is equally distributed. He said that in proportion to the population Ireland should have 83 representatives, not 101 as at present. The amendment was carried.

The Day Honored.

ST. JOHN, N. B., May 19. Yesterday was the one hundred and ninth anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists at St. John, and the day was duly observed and honored by the inhabitants of that city.

A Murderer to be Hanged.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 19. Porter Stock, nephew of the Rev. Sam. P. Jones, the noted revivalist, was found guilty of murder yesterday. He will be sentenced to death.

No Postponement.

MELBOURNE, May 19. The Governor of Victoria has refused to postpone the execution of the murderer Deeming, which has been fixed for Monday next.
