FURTHER INCREASE - Continued from page 1. Imported 133 carloads were shipped into the Province in March, 1951, against 163 carloads in March, 1950. Fertilizer showed a large increase with 45 carloads being imported compared with 24 carloads a year ago. There was an increase in the importation of machinery as 18 carloads were imported in the past month against nine in the same month last year. Sugar imports increased from four carloads in March, 1950 to 15 the past month.

That a survey with respect to Ragweed had been made of the Province during the past summer, and it was felt that this survey should be followed up again to eliminate such small amounts as have been located. It was also reported, that following the recommendation of the poultry committee, there is being established at the Experimental Station, Charlottetown, a new poultry laying house, and it is the intention to equip this with the most modern, up-to-date, automatic feeding and watering equipment that will not only prove of immense value in the experimental work at the Station, but will serve as a demonstration to enterprising poultry producers. Such equipment, while not common in this Province, has been widely accepted in many parts of Canada and the United States as being essential to economical poultry production.

Death Yesterday In City Of Mr. Joseph J. Trainor

Mr. Joseph J. Trainor, 56, former Provincial Police Commissioner and later R.C.M.P. officer, died suddenly at the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday morning. He had been in ill health for the past several months.

The late Mr. Trainor was born in Morell, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Trainor. As a very young man he went to Western Canada where he joined the North West Mounted Police. He enlisted in World War 1 at Battleford by joining the 26th Battalion and was later transferred to the 10th Battalion at Charlottetown. This unit was later amalgamated with the 104th Battalion, a New Brunswick unit and took the name of the 104th. A very powerful man, Mr. Trainor was a member of the crack tug-of-war team of the 104th Battalion that hung up perhaps the most impressive record of any Canadian athletic unit overseas. They scored many victories during a practically undefeated string but their most notable one was over the crack team from the London Metropolitan Police Force. They were coached by the late Major A. S. Robertson.

He served overseas where he was wounded, from 1918 to the end of the war. Returning home he joined the Charlottetown Police Force and served with that Force from 1922 to 1929 when he resigned to become head of the Provincial Police. When that body was taken over by the R.C.M.P. in 1932, he joined the Charlottetown R.C.M.P. Detachment with the rank of Sergeant. He remained with the R.C.M.P. until 1936 when he was forced to resign because of illness. After serving as chief engineer at the Provincial Sanatorium, the late Mr. Trainor joined the staff of the Dominion Department of Transport.

He is survived by three sons, former Hannah Shea, his wife, Weston ("Bucko"), Captain Charlottetown Islanders Hockey Team, Ralph, Charlottetown and Brother James, Abiate Novitate, Ottawa; also five daughters, Mrs. Thomas Baxter, Hamilton, Ont., Mrs. Roy MacKenzie, Greenwood, Ont., and Mrs. Jean and Mrs. Annabelle at home.

Discusses Seed Supply Problem

Quite a number of farmers have hay seed for sale and they want to know where they can sell it and the price to ask for it states Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. "We would simply tell our farm producers to clean their seed and send a four ounce sample along with \$1.00 to the Seed Branch at Sackville for grading," he says. The price of timothy in the retail trade at present is 49 cents for No. 1. Clovers at high again this year. No. 1 red is rating at 59.65 cents; alsike at 58 cents. Alfalfa is particularly high and is quoted for the Canadian product at 75 cents per pound.

"There would appear to be ample supplies of good oats and barley this year and also mixed feed for those who would like to see it that way. The price in the retail trade at present is as follows: Oats, \$5.00 to \$5.50, per bag; No. 1 barley, 5.25 per bag; wheat \$2.25-\$3.50 per bushel. There also seems to be a good supply of Laurentian turnip seed. We would suggest that everyone provide for his seed supplies of all kinds early and see that they are properly cleaned."

Fertilizer prices are now available and show a variation noticeable in local and mainland prices to the advantage of Island buyers. There is a slowing down apparently in the fertilizer orders this year and it looks as if the high prices for fertilizer and the poor prices for potatoes will curtail acreage this coming season.

"The potato starch program is already under way. This program is supposed to remove upwards of a million bushels from the Maritime potato supply and it is hoped will help sustain the regular market. An advance of 22¢ per bushel is being made and the balance will be predicated upon the average price for potatoes for the balance of the season. If the price remains at the present minimum of 44¢ that is what starch potatoes should be worth for the grades specified. If the price moves down on the open market the starch potato price will move accordingly. If the price of potatoes moves up above the present 44¢ level potatoes will move to market in accordance with improved prices.

"Markets at present are not strong. The American market is perking up a little bit but nothing to develop enthusiasm. It is too late now to hope for rejuvenation. The Canadian market is also in about the same condition. "Cobbler seed has suddenly collapsed and an effort is being made to move this commodity into starch and tablestock channels. We would suggest that every effort be made to move as many potatoes into this channel as can be handled by the operators. We would further urge that farm people acquaint themselves with the provisions of the starch policy regarding the prices prevailing for starch. Only this morning, for instance, 66¢ is mentioned in one of the papers which is definitely incorrect. (The price referred to was in a letter published in the Public Forum). It is hoped that starch prices will be maintained at 44¢ per bushel, but potato prices may vary one way or the other according to supply and demand."

Review By Premier Of Local Election Issues

The following review of issues in the Provincial election campaign was given last evening by Premier J. Walter Jones: "I suppose that the Liberals of our Province would like to hear me answer the arguments and point out the untruths of Leader Bell's broadcast of Monday night. "He said there never was so hurried an election and that people are scared of proposed new taxation which the Liberals are hurrying to put on. The answers are that four full sessions have been held by the Legislature as well as one short session, which is as many as any Legislature ever held since Confederation. It is not, apparently, that the Liberals are in a hurry, but that Mr. Bell is not prepared, as a leader should be.

"As for taxation we have already officially stated no new tax is anticipated and Mr. Bell well knows it requires legislation. He is trying merely to bluff and scare the electors. Mr. Drew will not oppose changes in the Constitution agreed by all eleven governments in Canada or he is dumbler than a great party leader should be. Premier Frost, of the only Progressive Conservative Government in Canada, is all in favor of the proposed change in the Constitution but somehow, somewhere, Mr. Bell will oppose the change—that is if he is elected.

"Then Mr. Bell talks of annual surpluses. He gives you the old-fashioned bluff of the surplus as of date February 28th. The fiscal year does not end on February 28th but on March 31st and the debt is fifteen million as he well knows. The Liberals have not increased the debt twelve millions. In rough figures it was eight millions in 1925 which was nearly four times the annual expenditures at that time; today it is 15 millions or only twice the annual expenditure. But Mr. Bell started talking of 'annual surpluses' and then switched to 'debts'.

"Our Government is proud of our surpluses which since the last election approximate \$1,200,000. Since Confederation there have not been many surpluses, and the last three total a larger amount than in all the other seventy-
