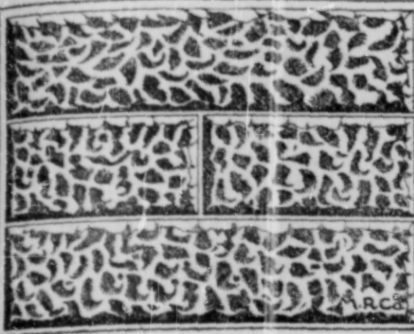

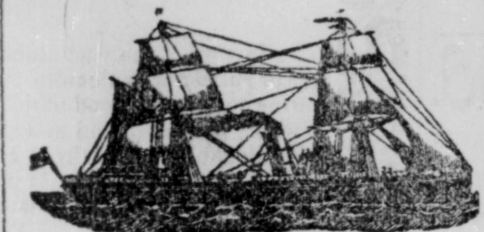

The heat was awarded Minnie, Tansy 2nd, Bijou 3rd, Romp L. 4th. Minnie thus wins the race.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

The Sixth Annual Provincial Convention will be held (D.V.) in the Methodist Church at Summerside, on Tuesday and Wednesday, Oct. 3rd and 4th.

Pastors of Churches, Superintendents of Sunday Schools, County and District Presidents, Officers and Executive of the Provincial Association are Ex-officio Members of Convention. Each school may send on delegate, and schools having a Membership over 100 may send two. Delegates who are not already members of convention as above will bring credential letter from the Superintendent or Pastor. If the Superintendent goes he will represent the School as Delegate.

The Local Committee at Summerside promise entertainment to Members of Convention and Delegates provided the name is sent to the Secretary, A. S. McKay, no later than the 30th September.

Let Schools appoint delegates early and forward the names on a post card giving the name of the School, the Lot or Township Number in which the School is held, the name of the Delegate and the P. O. address.

If you find you cannot attend after you are notified the Committee, kindly let them know. Have due regard for the committees and the families who arrange for your comfort. It is considerable disappointment to a family after they arrange for a Delegate to have no one come.

Buy a single First Class Ticket to Summerside. A Certificate of attendance from the Secretary will take you home.

A Reception Committee will be attendance at the Methodist Church, and all delegates will report there on their arrival.

Prof. Hamil and other prominent S. S. workers will take part, and this Convention will be a good one in every sense of the word. A program will be issued in the press, and notices given from time to time.

The expense of calling the Convention and obtaining a deputation makes it necessary for this Association to ask for aid. Kindly ask your school to take up a collection for the Provincial Association, and send the amount with one of your delegates or by letter to W. B. Ramsay, Treasurer, Summerside. Any sum will be thankfully received. Collections will be taken at the Convention.

All meetings of the Convention are open to the public.

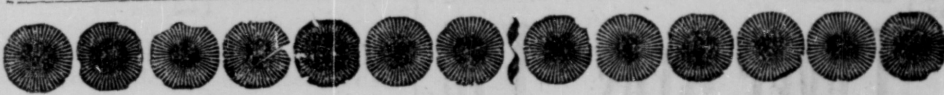
