

**PILLS SLOW
CAT INCREASE**

LONDON (AP) — Mrs. Ria Noyes, who keeps 17 cats, said here she is slowing down the feline population by feeding her female cats contraceptive pills.

The cat lover lives in a low cost housing estate owned by the town council at Woking. After her neighbors complained about her cats, she was warned by the council: "Make sure there aren't any more of them."

"After that warning," she told reporters, "I had to do something desperate. So, I went out and bought those pills."

She said she took action after her neighbors petitioned the council to do something. The neighbors said the cats dug up their plants and flowers and were a general nuisance.

"I give the pills to the females—at the proper time," she said. "I don't have the money to have them operated on."

A widow, Mrs. Noyes said that even pill-buying knocks a dent in her budget.

"Most of my cats are strays," she went on, "or animals that have been abandoned by their owners. I certainly would never think of having any of them destroyed."

Asked how the pills were working, she replied: "So far so good, but I've only been using them for a few months. I got through the spring all right, though."

**Paul Martin Sees
Canada Ultimate
Member Of OAS**

BANFF, Alta. (CP)—External Affairs Minister Martin said here a Canadian membership in the Organization of American States is "part of the ultimate destiny of Canada as a country of this hemisphere."

He offered no clue as to when this part of Canada's ultimate destiny might occur.

In a speech to the second annual Banff conference on world development, he said he has made tentative plans to visit several Latin American countries around the end of this year.

He said Latin America should be given a prominent place in Canada's external relations "such as it has not, generally speaking, enjoyed in the past."

Latin America had been sadly neglected by Canadian schools, colleges and newspapers, though there were "hopeful signs" this situation was changing.

"I would hope that our universities, professions and intellectual groups would deliberately take a more active interest in the organizational and institutional life of our hemispheres as a whole," Martin said.

Discussions are continuing with the Inter-American Development Bank on provision of Canadian loans to Latin America.

"We have not up to now had a separate government-to-government assistance program for the Latin American countries."

The program of so-called soft loans for development purposes will be the first step in this direction.

"Over a period of time, subject of course to our capacity on an overall basis to give assistance abroad, more Canadian aid in various forms can be expected to flow to Latin America," he added.

**CGS Duties
Are Reviewed**

OTTAWA (CP)—Duties of the Canadian Coast Guard are being reviewed, Transport Minister Pickersgill said in the Commons.

He was replying to Lloyd C. Crouse (PC—Queens—Lunenburgh) who complained that a Canadian fishing vessel had to seek help from a Russian fishing trawler when the Coast Guard refused to assist it in a gale.

Mr. Crouse described it as a disgraceful incident. Mr. Pickersgill said there were circumstances involved, which he did not spell out.

As a result of the incident, Mr. Pickersgill said, a careful review of coast guard duties is being undertaken, with particular attention to the coast guard's responsibilities towards fishing vessels.

Later, in reply to Donald MacInnes (PC—Cape Breton South), the transport minister said recruitment of staff is not delaying the opening of a coast guard training school at Bonney, N.S.

Some staff already has been engaged, he said. It was 1-1 of the school would be ready for classes by the fall of 1965.
